## Vision for Rail Corridor is Becoming a Reality

### Council Unanimously Votes to Purchase "Kirkland Segment" of Eastside Rail Corridor

Kirkland's vision for multi-modal transportation, pedestrian connectivity to parks and schools, and bicycle pathways has come closer to reality thanks to the City Council's unanimous vote to enter into a purchase and sale agreement with the Port of Seattle for 5.5 miles of the Eastside Rail Corridor that lie within Kirkland's City limits. The "Kirkland Segment" extends from 108th Avenue NE at the South Kirkland Park and Ride north to 132nd Place NE in Totem Lake. The purchase price is \$5 million.

The purchase and eventual development of the Kirkland Segment as a bicycle, pedestrian, and transit corridor has been a long-standing vision of the Park Board, Transportation Commission, and the Planning Commission.

The Urban Land Institute in its [2011 study of the Totem Lake Business District](#) recommended acquiring the rail corridor as one of the best actions Kirkland could take to catalyze development in Totem Lake.

## City Closely Monitors Governor's Budget Reduction Alternatives

Sometime this winter, a storm forming in Olympia will work its way north. It will hit Kirkland. And it could inflict more than \$1 million in financial damage every year for years to come. That storm is the State's 2012 supplemental budget. Kirkland's elected and administrative leaders are tracking it as it works its way through the State Legislature.

The Legislature's primary responsibility is to stitch together a \$1.4 billion gash in Washington's finances. If the Governor's proposed budget strategy is adopted, it will accomplish this primarily by cutting services to residents and shared revenues to local governments, such as Kirkland.

Kirkland's primary threats derive from the reduction in cities' share of liquor taxes and a proposal

to permanently reduce the Annexation Sales Tax Credit by more than 10 percent. These reductions could eliminate at least \$1 million in City revenue per year, with the impact of the reduction growing larger each of the 10 following years.

Over time, the City stands to lose more than \$14 million or 35 percent of critical funding for post-annexation services.

"We ... respectfully request that you maintain the State's commitment to provide this temporary sales tax credit so that cities can keep our commitment of providing urban services to our newly annexed residents," wrote Mayor



## NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS: Neighborhood Associations Build Community, Enhance Neighborhoods, and Make Connections

In 1991, when Central Houghton became the City's first neighborhood to file its incorporation papers, about 40,000 people lived in Kirkland, Randy Barton was Mayor and the City was still adjusting to the last major annexation that doubled the population of Kirkland. As the year 2011 comes to a close, the New Juanita Neighborhoods Association is adjusting to its expanded borders, the Denny Creek Neighborhood Alliance is now the Finn Hill Neighborhood Alliance with a broader mission, and Evergreen Hill (formerly Kingsgate) Neighborhood has dotted the "I"s and crossed the "T"s on its by-laws and Articles of Incorporation. Kirkland will soon boast 13 neighborhood associations. As independent entities, the associations work to enhance their neighborhoods, support participation in City government, and foster a greater sense of community among Kirkland residents.

"Being involved in your neighborhood association gives you an opportunity to have a voice in decisions that affect the livability of your neighborhood," notes Kari Page, Neighborhood Outreach Coordinator. "It is an exceptional way to partner with your neighbors, the City, and other organizations to develop solutions to shared problems."



Prior to the City creating the Neighborhood Services Program and hiring Page in 1999, there were seven official associations but not all were active. Since then six neighborhoods joined the ranks of an association which make them eligible for City grants.

Through the Neighborhood Matching Grant Program associations can develop and implement specific projects for their neighborhood that support physical improvements, neighborhood identity projects, special events, leadership training, and communications. Some common projects include websites, newsletters, and picnics.

"There are many opportunities for residents to become involved with their neighborhood associations," notes Norm Storme, Coordinator of the Kirkland Alliance of Neighborhoods (KAN) and Juanita Neighborhood resident. "Citizens and businesses have a great deal of talent and energy that improve the quality of life in their respective neighborhoods." KAN is a coalition of the Chairs and Vice-Chairs of the thirteen neighborhood associations that help further help communicate neighborhood concerns to the appropriate City entity. 

## Be Ready for Mother Nature and Old Man Winter

**N**ow that Daylight Saving Time is in hibernation for the winter, the City's Emergency Management Team encourages residents and businesses to be ready for whatever winter conditions Mother Nature and Old Man Winter decide to unleash in the coming months.

### To prepare your home and business before the next winter storm, you may want to:

- Identify dangerous trees that are likely to fall. If they are on your property, you are responsible for proper removal. Contact the Planning and Community Development Department at 425-587-3225 for removal requirements. If they are on public property, notify the Public Works Department at 425-587-3900.
- Clear fallen leaves and debris from roof gutters, downspouts, and storm drains to reduce flooding. Dispose of debris in yard waste container or compost bin.
- Insulate outside, exposed water faucets. If a freeze warning is issued, leave one indoor faucet open to slowly drip warm water, reducing the chances of pipes freezing.

### In the case of a power outage:

- Have a safe, alternative heat source and supply of fuel in case there is a power outage. If you use a kerosene heater, gas lantern, or stove inside, ventilation must be maintained to avoid build up of toxic fumes.
- Never use a charcoal barbecue or generator inside your home or garage.
- Register life-sustaining and medical equipment with your utility company.

### Should you have to drive:

- Check weather and road conditions before travelling, especially across mountain passes.
- Make sure the gas tank is full.
- Stock a scraper or brush, small shovel, jumper cables, tow chain, flares and a bag of sand or cat litter for

traction in your car.

- Store a blanket, heavy boots, warm clothing, gloves and flashlight in your car.
- Use "all weather" tires that are in good condition and know when to use traction devices.
- Familiarize yourself with priority snow routes in areas where you will be driving. (See below)

### KIRKLAND'S SNOW PRIORITY ROUTES

In the event of snow requiring street maintenance, the City will give first priority for snow plowing on roads that are near Evergreen Hospital and lead to and from I-405, transit routes, schools and fire stations. Second priority will be given to arterials that have above normal traffic use. Steep and hilly public roadways that are difficult to maintain will be closed. Joan McBride in the letter to the House Ways and Means Committee.

Left intact, the 10-year credit is worth roughly \$40 million. All of that money would help pay for the share of services left unfunded by revenues from the City's newest neighborhoods. More importantly, the credit justified the annexation of an area that costs more to serve than it contributes in revenue.

"Kirkland will spend ... more each year in the new neighborhoods than the ... credit generates," added Mayor McBride in her letter to the Committee. "But we were willing to move ahead [with annexation] because it was the right thing to do and the credit significantly closed the gap. The credit was critical to this decision. We would not have moved ahead without the annexation sales tax program."

The Washington legislature established the annexation sales tax program in 2006 to encourage cities to absorb unincorporated pockets of urban populations. By doing this, cities could more proactively develop urban areas, while maintaining open, rural spaces. This approach is fundamental to the state's Growth Management Act.

On November 28, 2011 the Governor convened a 30-day special legislative session; the regular 2012 legislative session is set to begin January 9, 2012. In the summer of 2010, an extensive public outreach effort was initiated with residents and businesses about the community's vision for the future development of portion of the Corridor that lies within Kirkland. The purpose of the [Eastside Rail Corridor Interest Statement](#) is to guide evaluation of proposals for development.

Interim acquisition funding, in the form of an Interfund Loan, was approved by the Council in the amount of \$4 million from the Water/Sewer and Surface Water Utilities to help purchase the Segment. The loan will be repaid by re-prioritizing other capital projects or possible issuance of debt or grant funding that may be secured. Funds to eventually develop the Segment could include voted debt, corporate sponsorship, and state and federal grants. In the coming months, staff will work with City advisory boards, neighborhood leadership, and key stakeholders to gather input about the preferred loan repayment source.
