KIRKLAND CITY COUNCIL RESOLUTION R-5029

A resolution passed by Kirkland City Council on January 21, 2014, selecting sites and uses to be considered for a potential facility to replace the Juanita Aquatic Center and directing the Parks and Community Services department to solicit resident input.

RESOLUTION R-5029

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KIRKLAND SELECTING SITES AND USES TO BE CONSIDERED FOR A POTENTIAL FACILITY TO REPLACE THE JUANITA AQUATIC CENTER AND DIRECTING THE PARKS AND COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT TO SOLICIT RESIDENT INPUT.

WHEREAS, research indicates that swimming is an activity that provides considerable individual and community benefits: it improves general health and wellness; it can be continued for a lifetime; it allows those who are unable to walk or run the opportunity for exercise; it fills a recreational need for both individuals and families across all economic and social strata; and it improves community safety by enhancing water safety for our children; and

WHEREAS, the benefits of swimming promote an active and fit community that, in turn, ensures that Kirkland remains attractive as both an economically vibrant city and as a recreational destination; and

WHEREAS, aquatic facilities have been an essential part of the Kirkland community and culture for over 45 years, beginning with construction of Peter Kirk Pool in 1968, followed in 1971 with the construction of the Juanita Aquatic Center at Juanita High School; and

WHEREAS, since 2001 the City of Kirkland's Comprehensive Park, Recreation, and Open Space (PROS) Plan has identified the need for more multi-use recreation space in the community; and

WHEREAS, the 2007 Kirkland Indoor Recreation Feasibility Study described a prototype multi-use recreation center which would respond to community needs and interests and which included an aquatics facility component; and

WHEREAS, according to the standards of the National Recreation and Parks Association, the current aquatic facilities do not meet local needs; and

WHEREAS, Kirkland lacks aquatic facilities to more broadly serve its general population, especially in comparison with national statistics and trends; and

WHEREAS, in August of 2013 the Lake Washington School District Board of Directors adopted a resolution to place a school bond measure on the February 2014 ballot; and

WHEREAS, the proposed 2014 school bond measure does not include funding for the replacement of the Juanita Aquatic Center, located at Juanita High School in Kirkland, and therefore the Aquatic Center will close as early as 2017; and

WHEREAS, the Juanita Aquatic Center is the sole public indoor, year-round aquatic facility in the Kirkland community which provides a variety of critical recreational, educational, competitive, and health and wellness activities for residents of all ages; and

WHEREAS, in September of 2013 the Lake Washington School District Board of Directors adopted a resolution affirming its intent to enter into future pool partnerships with cities and/or other entities and resolving to authorize a portion of unspent existing school capital funds for potential pool partnerships should the 2014 school bond measure pass; and

WHEREAS, the City is committed to partnering with the Lake Washington School District and other interested public and private organizations to explore options for replacing the Juanita Aquatic Center by 2017; and

WHEREAS, in September of 2013 the City Council adopted a resolution amending the City's 2013-2014 Work Program to include studying options for replacement of the Juanita Aquatic Center and subsequently allocated funding for this purpose; and

WHEREAS, the Parks and Community Services Department has completed a preliminary evaluation of potential sites and presented its findings and conclusions to the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the City Council believes a new public aquatic facility must meet the needs of the Lake Washington School District as well as serve all members of the public from children to seniors and must provide programming including swim instruction, recreation and competition opportunities as well as wellness, fitness and rehabilitation options; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to better understand the aquatic siting options, interests, and level of support by residents;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Kirkland as follows:

Section 1. The Parks and Community Services Department is directed to:

1. Conduct further investigation and analysis of locations for a facility to replace the Juanita Aquatic Center, to


include, but not be limited to: Juanita Beach Park, South Norway Hill Park, and the North Kirkland Community Center.

2. Design a facility to serve needs of the Lake Washington School District as well as the broadest possible general public population.
3. Conduct outreach with the community and potential project partners on possible facility components as well as siting preferences.
4. Complete feasibility and cost analysis for converting Peter Kirk Pool to year-round use by 2017 as an interim solution.
5. Provide a report to the City Council with recommendations from the Park Board on facility components and siting by no later than April 1, 2014.


Section 2. The City Manager is authorized and directed to implement steps necessary to achieve these tasks.



COMMUNITY OUTREACH

1. **EnviroIssues Report**
EnviroIssues facilitated community meetings on February 25th at Kamiakin Middle School and February 26th at North Kirkland Community Center. This report includes a summary and transcripts of the comments received at those meetings.
2. **Emails Received**
City staff collected emails received from community members from September, 2013 through March 10, 2014.
3. **Survey Monkey Online Questionnaire**
An online survey was conducted February 27th – March 10th and had 869 participants. The summarized responses and written comments are attached.
4. **EMC Research Telephone Survey**
EMC Research conducted telephone interviews of 400 registered voters in the City of Kirkland between March 5th and March 9th.

CommentForm_1	<p>I am most concerned that the City of Kirkland will build a competitive swimming pool (preferably 50 meter) and leave no space for swim lessons (warm water.) I am against a leisure pool/lazy river/flow rider. My concern is that a leisure pool would cost too much to build and maintain. I am a parent of a 10-year-old son, and honestly, we would probably visit a leisure pool twice a year (as would most of our friends with children). Competitive and lap swimmers have a serious lack of pool facilities and swim times in this area. People who would use a competitive/lap pool may only be a small percentage of the population, but they will be regular users. I swim at Juanita 4-5 times per week, and would use a new pool with this frequency. I would like to see a pool that benefits the people who regularly use swimming pools. Also - I would like to see the development of swim lessons for low-income families (free and reduced). The kids in this area who don't know how to swim are low-income - not middle-class families.</p>
CommentForm_2	<p>To keep the pool viable you need to keep it full. Most pools in the area have evening programming consisting of sparsely populated lap swims. The new pool needs to support competitive swimming, diving, syncro, water polo, lessons, etc. Please, please check to see the needs of each activity thoroughly before you finalize a plan.</p> <p>50 meters would be so great! 25 yard deep (8 lanes) deep, deep water polo practice @ the same time as a full swim practice</p> <p>Long distance - 50m - space is very in demand for club swimming</p> <p>Diving and swimming at the same time, 50m is the best choice</p>
CommentForm_3	<p>I have 6 kids. I have home schooled all of them. They have all been a part of Juanita swim team. My son (5th) is a senior and they went to state and placed 6th in free. We have so much water around - everyone should learn how to swim o have the ability to swim. I know by having my son (5th) swim for Juanita it kept him out of trouble - instead it kept him into a leader + captain of his swim team. My youngest (6th) child - in 6th grade - has been wanting to swim for Juanita for the last 3 years! I told her there may not be a pool for her to swim at if the school district gets what they want.</p>

Having that kind of community resource would be wonderful; I confess I am jealous of my folks for their access. Thank you for soliciting community input. It would be lovely to benefit the whole community especially if a bond is requested of the community.

I attended an earlier presentation by WAVE aquatics and came away convinced that the best pool facility from a need and usage perspective would be a 50 meter x 25 yard pool with a separate warm therapy/training pool. Given the size of such a facility, I don't think the Juanita Beach could accommodate it.

If the facility could also include a gym and other types of fitness services, that would be fine. But my primary/sole interest is that Kirkland build a pool facility that can meet the full spectrum of community needs - competitive training, and meets (for all age groups), swim lessons, water aerobics, family swim, scuba training, etc. As a member of the Lake Washington Master Swim Club, I'm especially interested in finding a new home pool for our program.

Has the council determined the appropriate size of facility to meet the needs of the community?

Has the council reviewed the plan from RenewtheLegacy.org?

Is the council planning on operating the facility at a loss at the expense of the tax payers?

Does the council truly understand the need to replace the current year round facility (Juanita) with a large enough facility to accommodate the vast groups who want and need the use of the pool.

The needs of all users can be met only if a 50 meter pool is a part of the final project. This is a once in a 40-year opportunity to build the facility the community needs now. There must be sufficient space + time for lessons, seniors, high school, club, masters, therapy, scuba, recreation, synchro, etc. Anything smaller than 50 meters will mean some groups won't get their health, safety, fitness, or recreation needs met. Important to remember that with any lap pool or at least 1 teaching pool will also be needed. 2 teaching pools would better meet the needs for warm water lessons, therapy and classes.

CommentForm_10 1) Why are you not considering Totem Lake
2) large pool serves more than just one community. Where are you in talks with other districts? (Northshore in particular)
3) What about onsite physical therapy for community center?
4) 25 yard pool doesn't address the need for all the uses of the pool. The only choice is a 50 meter to meet needs of multiple communities and gets groups in and out of the pool at reasonable times of the day

CommentForm_11 One of the major concerns about a pool is a concern about funding (many aquatic facilities operate at a deficit). Given that, it would make sense to include a pool that can satisfy more programs (which means more funding). A 50m pool x 25 yard pool can satisfy multiple programs at once (diving, swim teams, open swim and lap swim) which would enable more revenue. A pool with the these dimensions would allow approximately 22 lanes of swimming.

Additionally pools within the facility, e.g. a therapy pool or zero-depth entry, can be at the same time as the 50m pool.

CommentForm_12 Possibly the pool/competition site could be located at N. Kirkland Community Center, and recreational facilities could be built at a different location due to space issues.

If there is limited funding, it could also easily be constructed as a two-phase project. (waiting to build recreational/water park facility until more money is provided.)

Definitely build new facilities!

CommentForm_13 Anything small would fail to meet local recreational and competitive needs. Simply replacing what exists is not sufficient.

Would love to see both recreational and competitive pools like Snohomish

CommentForm_14 If Kirkland funds this project without other cities, Kirkland needs to have priority scheduling for the facility and the facility can only be "rented out" to private groups/other cities when there are "dead" times

CommentForm_15 We don't need two large facilities. Redmond needs a partner and has already done all the leg work.

Partnering with Redmond would provide the best way to deliver a great project in the desired time frame.

CommentForm_16 Is the St. Edwards park pool completely off the consideration? Couldn't some agreement be made with the State? There is a gym building on the property too. I know negotiation would be extensive, but a completely new facility would be even more costly.

CommentForm_17 If you choose the NKCC, I think you must have adequate classroom space for Zumba, etc.

I don't think fitness machines are needed in this facility

Where would you have the fitness classes held at NKCC if that choice was made? It would take at least a year to build this facility.

I think the Albertson's location might work well.

Introduce myself;1. Resident of Kirkland,2. I live on Finn Hill.3. Work as a coach and personal trainer including swim instructor.4. I use Juanita pool every day either for personal use as masters swimmer, or as a coach or while giving swim instruction. I used to be a partner in a business in Juanita and city officials would sometimes ask, "what can we do to help your business?" I appreciated the interest and concern, but at the time what I really needed were customers and I didn't see how city officials could help with that. Now however, we have this Aquatics center on the table and it is obvious how a project like this could have helped a business like mine. This AC will attract people from Bellevue, Issaquah, Monroe, not to mention communities much closer to Kirkland. (For instance; Members of my masters swim team often car-pool to West Seattle in the summer so we can train in the 50m Coleman pool in Lincoln Park. I think a new, well designed, and well programmed pool in Kirkland will have the same draw, but year round! People from Seattle will be making special trips to Kirkland in order to train and race in a facility unlike any other north of Federal Way). For this reason I think the pool should be located in a spot with retail shops and restaurants within easy walking distance. A facility like this will be a huge enhancement to businesses located adjacent to it. Parents dropping kids off for lessons or swim practice could make a quick trip to shop or get a cup of Coffee; participants in day long swim competitions would have a place to get lunch or dinner; and visitors from out of town would feel encouraged to stay and sample some of the businesses in Kirkland. Locating the pool at this Community Center makes some sense because of its proximity to the current pool, and the Freeway, but an AC located here would hardly be integrated into the business community of Kirkland. Juanita Beach or Kingsgate make more sense for this reason. An AC in Juanita would indeed be spectacular, but I fear the difficulty in re-working the park plan that took so much time to create, and the backlash from destroying one or both of the baseball fields and perhaps the Youth Services building, would delay or side-track the effort. And we need to replace Juanita Pool NOW. On the other hand, the Kingsgate location is close to a blank slate, and is also located next to an established business district, so the AC would act as a true enhancement to the business and recreational life not just for that neighborhood, but for the city, and our whole region as well.







- 142 Loss of large park space at Juanita Beach.
- 143 I would prefer to not lose any existing park land.
- 144 None it would be a great location. I would ok with the North Kirkland Community Center site as well.
- 145
All of the proposed sites are too small to build a good facility. The Community Center site has the drawback of being too hilly, Juanita Beach park will have too much environmental impact on the lake, and South Norway hill is inconvenient.
- 146 My #2 choice would be the North Kirkland Community Center. S Norway Hill is a wonderful natural area, of which there are far too few in Kirkland. Destruction of this park would be an abomination. It is not easily accessed and traffic issues would be major. This shouldn't even be on the list IMHO. Juanita Beach Park (north side) is actively used all year long. We are so short of open grassy parks in the north end of town, loss of this area would be very sad. Traffic is awful in this area already.
- 147 I like North Kirkland because I believe it has the parking capacity to handle the facility. I do not want it at Juanita Beach because it would destroy the open space there that is currently used for baseball and other activities. It would also add to an already congested traffic situation on Juanita Drive and make parking almost impossible for the park, the swimming facility and the Spud Fish and Chips restaurant located there.
- 148 Availability of parking, ease of access
- 149 South Norway Hill is to far for most of Kirklands residents
- 150 Juanita Beach is already so crowded, traffic & parking
- 151 Traffic
- 152 The South Norway Hill Park area is flawed for two important reasons. One, you will have to remove so many beautiful trees to put it in, it is not worth deforesting one of the few stands of trees in Kirkland. Two, It is in a poor location being so far north in Kirkland. Difficult for most "Kirklandites" to access. I don't like the Juanita Beach Park idea much because it takes away from existing ball fields which are hard to come by for youth. Plus, I think it would increase traffic congestion in an area that does not have roads to handle it. Further there is already so much visual density in the area with the large apartment complexes next door that it would just look bad.
- 153 None, I have concerns that people will not realize that high school swim will be impacted if they choose to have a shallow pool with lazy rivers and water slides.
- 154 None
- 155 I chose NKCC over Juanita Beach Park because I think the preservation of green space is more needed and fitting at the beach location. South Norway Hill is just not easily accessible. My main concerns are that in the visual info. board for the proposed NKCC site, we lose the outdoor basketball court and kids playground which are some of the most utilized pieces of the park. If these were preserved, I would be 100% for the NKCC site.
- 156 I believe the Pool should be as Close to Juanita HS (If not at the HS) as Possible. Concerns: North Kirkland Comm Center: 1. 124th already congested enough with traffic flow. 2. Residential Neighborhood for the most part 3. Parking Juanita Beach 1. You are 2-3 blocks from hitting the Lake Washington HS Geography Zone 2. Parking 3. Traffic Congestion South Norway Hill 1. Not sure where this would be actually, but you would put the pool just a few blocks from the Bothell City Limits
- 157 1. The North Kirkland Community Center and Juanita Beach Park are closest to the current location of the pool. 2. While the Juanita pool is an indoor, year round pool. The Kingsgate area already has at least 4 pools that I can think of for use during the warmer months.
- 158 Loss of little league fields if the Juanita Beach Park site is chosen.
- 159 Do not use Juantia beach park as the traffic would block the only access to Juanita drive north which is already a mess. 124th has much more access and wouldn't cause the traffic problems that Juanita Beach would....
- 160 Parking issues and traffic at the Juanita Beach Park location.

What concerns do you have about any of the sites?

- 161 Juanita Beach park already has issues around parking, as well as huge traffic and congestion issues at certain times of day and specially in the summer. Also, I think that residents greatly benefit from that open area - an enclosed pool does not need such a wonderful beach view!
- 162 Juanita Beach is already too crowded and to add this traffic wouldn't move. Please leave the open space at the park.
- 163 I am concerned about traffic. Not necessarily the neighborhood traffic, I am worried about being able to get in and out of the parking lot. I am concerned that even though this is an idea out there it won't happen or the schools will not have enough access to run swim teams.
- 164 North Kirkland parking and traffic congestion problems. How it might impact the neighborhood. Juanita beach. Fine if baseball fields remain in tack. Don't really no Norway hill park.
- 165 Traffic congestion
- 166 If we are going to do this, let's do it right. I'm concerned about the size of the space for the right structure.
- 167 Parking and traffic at Juanita Beach is already an issue, adding a pool would have significant negative impacts.
- 168 Parking at Juanita would be difficult.
- 169 Partnering with another city is vital, so the site should not be picked until the partner is obtained. Kenmore might prefer the Juanita site, Bothell might prefer another one, etc.
- 170 North Kirkland - Possibly enough space depending on how much the site is used for, nice to have the little park across the street. However, during peak traffic hours in the evening it could be extremely difficult to turn out to the East on 124th, and like wise if you were trying to turn in from 124th headed East. It's also not an ideal place for a traffic light. Juanita Beach - Lovely location but serious concerns about the peak traffic times and accessibility. Even in the summer or on a nice warm day the park there and across the street are both full to the max. It's a very desirable location, but not if you can't get there. The streets leading in are fine, but are small and again can only handle so much traffic. Would the building block the view of the lake from the road? It would be very sad, that's one of the beautiful things about that area, being able to see all the gorgeous land and the lake.
- 171 Juanita has a lot of traffic. I think this would be a great addition to the neighborhood, and would not be a traffic nuisance during winter when the lake is not as crowded and the farmer's market is not operating, but I'd be concerned about traffic back up onto Juanita during the summer, when all three things (lake, market and pool) would be great entertainment choices and parking is very limited. I'd like to see a sidewalk installed on Juanita to all the residential neighborhoods for those living in Juanita and Finn Hill neighborhoods, so they have other alternatives for safe transportation on those type of days prior to this the swimming pool opening in this location.
- 172 Concern with traffic and parking at JuanitaBeach site. If this was properly addressed that could be a fantastic location.
- 173 South Norway is too far from where I live Juanita Beach Park has more traffic/parking issues than NKCC
- 174 great idea anywhere you put it. biggest concern is making the neighbors happy!!
- 175 Norway Hill is a forest site. it should be excluded from consideration because of its sensitive nature.
- 176 Traffic safety
- 177 I wouldn't think the South Norway Hill Park would be as accessible to the general population of Kirkland/Juanita residents. The North Kirkland Community Center and Juanita Beach are both on main streets and very close to freeway access. The Juanita Beach location would also be a good location for children/teens during the summer while school is out to keep them occupied and out of trouble. :)
- 178 Norht Juanita site would eliminate the baseball fields. Would probably preclude building the skateboard half pipe as was planned for the north side development. This parcel of land should be left as open space keeping the ball fields and providing a liesure site for public use for variety of activities, to include many outdoor gatherings, special events, etc. - Placing the aquatic center there would create massive traffic congestion which would be hard to mitigate due to the design of the street accesses and newly developed structures/businesses.

What concerns do you have about any of the sites?

183	My concern for both the NKCC and South Norway Hill sites is that putting a large-scale facility and grounds there would encroach on residential space in terms of privacy, noise level, traffic, etc. This may seem true for the Juanita Beach Park site as well, but in reality, there are already so many sports teams/lessons that practice in that space, in addition to the farmers' market, summer festivals, and the many often-frequented businesses that are located in that same area.
184	I think Juanita Beach should be left as a beach park as is.
185	Parking / space seems inadequate at either NKCC or Juanita Beach. (I am not familiar with South Norway Hill.)
186	The Juanita Beach option ins concerning due to the already heavy traffic - adding such a facility will just add to the congestion and limited parking. Also, would take away from two of our limited baseball fields. Another suggestion would be the old Albertson's?
187	I don't think the new facility should take away current park land, like the area at Juanita beach
188	I am concerned about the proposed South Norway Hill Park site for several reasons. The selection of this site would disrupt a well-established neighborhood. The low speed residential roads would be challenged to accommodate increased traffic. The site would require clearing many trees, which provide natural habitat for wildlife and beauty to the area. South Norway Hill Park is on the northern tip of Kirkland, decreasing the ease of access to the majority of Kirkland residents.
189	Bad traffic around Juanita Beach Park
190	Ground water level at the Juanita Beach; losing significant trees and the distance from south Kirkland and Downtown Kirkland at Norway Hill; traffic configuration at all three sites; I would like to see multilevel parking to reduce the impact on too much land being taken up with ground level parking
191	Baseball diamonds @ Juanita Beach are heavily used by KNLL. Where would this baseball usage go? Again, doesn't mean Juanita Beach shouldn't be used as the pool site, just wondering where baseball usage would go instead.
192	For the North Kirkland Community Center site, I am concerned about the impact it would have on the neighborhood, particularly the homes around it. This site seems to show the greatest impact area involving homes. Also, it would eliminate the park already there. Furthermore, 124th is already a very busy street. If a pool were to be built there, I would expect the site to include a park and the facilities currently available through the North Kirkland Community Center. For South Norway Park, the concern would be having to cut down so many trees to make a space for the site. The site that seems to be most feasible, with open space already there and the least impact on residential homes and neighborhoods, is Juanita Beach Park.
193	The South Norway Hill Park site currently is a forested site. Avoid converting it to developed space as long as possible. Juanita Beach site access by road/car is not great; just one 2-lane road passes the site and this area is already heavily congested during the morning and evening commutes when adult swimmers most likely would access the pool. Also, some big trees would need to be removed from J. Beach site. Parking would have to be developed.
194	I think accessibility is important.
195	N.Kirkland CC site is too small for adequate parking Juanita Beach North and surrounding area already has traffic grid lock. S. Norway Hill Park location is inconvenient by automobile. I-405 north bound is a parking lot in the afternoon. The preferred location should be Mc Auffle Park! Currently, the property is under utilized. It is readily accessible from the Cross Kirkland Corridor by foot and bicycle Location can accommodate a recreational site with adequate parking. Is a more central location than the other listed proposed sites
196	South Norway Hill is too remote and takes out a whole forest. Juanita Beach is fine, but traffic flow not as good through there as North Kirk CC.
197	I don't know much about the South Norway Hill Park, although I do believe that having the pool so far north doesn't seem to make as much sense to me since the Mountlake Terrace and Lynnwood pools are also up north. I believe having the Kirkland pool further south, in a location closer towards downtown, would be a better choice.
198	Never heard about South Norway Hill Park, although we are residing in Kirkland for 12 years. Juanita Beach Park does not have enough space for that. It was just recently remodeled and our family with three kids love it that way as a nice place to walk, hike, watch nature, play in the sand and swim in summer time.

What concerns do you have about any of the sites?

- 199 I heard that the NKCC site would be the most expensive, so I think that is not a good choice. I also think 124th has enough traffic issues and I don't think we should add to it. I like Juanita Beach Park, but in the summer it is already so busy--consider the impact on an area that already has development that did not consider such an increase in traffic. Also, I like the play fields there and think the open space makes the condensed development project more aesthetically pleasing. South Norway Hill is a bit far north, but it isn't a super high-traffic area, so I think the additional traffic could be well managed for that site. Maybe partner with Woodinville/Bothell as well? That location would be very accessible to some of their residents and there is no facility like it in the area.
- 200 I think the environmental impact to Juanita Beach Park is too great.
- 201 I think the Norway Hill Park Location is too far from downtown Kirkland. Juanita Beach Park might have congestion issue.
- 202 Distance from Downtown/Lakeview area, traffic challenges
- 203 Parking
- 204 South Norway Hill Park is further away and with traffic conditions only becoming more challenging as Kirkland grows, the greater distance makes this site undesirable for those residents of South Kirkland communities.
- 205 I like the location of Juanita park -- central access to everyone, but traffic can be difficult at peak hours. If No. Kirkland, need to a signal at the corner.
- 206 I think Juanita beach is at a difficult intersection and I don't know where South Norway Hill Park is. North Kirkland community center is at a good location and has a playground right there.
- 207 No more exercise classes during the day.
- 208 Doesn't seem like there would be enough room at JBeach Park?
- 209 If Juanita Beach would ease the parking then I support it as the top choice. Otherwise, I think North Kirkland is underutilized now and would be the best option.
- 210 NK Community Center - impact on traffic
- 211 Loitering
- 212 The time required to complete such improvements as well as inputting proper safety controls. Example, Juanita Beach Park was remodeled recently and looks great, but still has many serious safety hazards such patrons being able to get stuck under the cement slab out near the end of the dock.
- 213 The North Kirkland site has terrible access for vehicles and pedestrians (crosswalk west of the site). 124th is very busy and it is almost impossible to make a left out of the facility onto 124th already. Plus, it is an extremely small, sloped site.
- 214 The North Kirkland Center offers the best roads and less intrusion on other neighborhoods. Why can't the pool be located at a school?
- 215 Environmental impacts on Juanita Beach Park and South Norway Hill. North Kirkland Community Center seems to be the best location as it already contains a building. Developing NKCC into an aquatic center would require the least amount of environmental clearance -- both trees and animals that live in these forested area. I am concerned that the Juanita Beach location would have soil that is too soft to hold an aquatic center, because of its proximity to Lake Washington.
- 216 That it will create even bigger traffic jams in side streets and that access in and out of facility will difficult at best. That activities be affordable for those who live in the area - all incomes of family - and truly accessible for kids to learn.

223 If North Kirkland Community Center was chosen there would be a huge impact on surrounding residential neighborhood from a traffic stand point. It would become too congested. I think a better use of NKCC is expanding for more physical fitness classes, community outreach classes, small events and such. South Norway Hill Park is not centrally located and could be better used as a park as well as adding a community center for the neighborhood in the future.

224 - Want to make sure a pool is built before Juanita H.School pool is destroyed so the high school swim team can continue un-interrupted. - That the pool is available to high school boys and girls during the swim team season at a convenient after school ti

225 Juanita Beach has been recently renovated and offers a lovely lake and play / walk experience. South Norway Hill has a beautiful walking trail and it would be detrimental to take out any of the existing woods in Kirkland. Also, South Norway is not as centrally located as either Juanita Beach or North Kirkland Community Center.

226 Parking and congestion.

227 My biggest concern would be traffic and its affect on neighboring homes. I would not want a large public facility adjacent to my neighborhood. I do like the idea of a community pool and fitness facility, but not at the expense of more traffic in my neighborhood. Since I live in Juanita, the NKCC would be my least preferred site with Juanita Beach being second. These areas are already congested, and I don't see how a large facility could be added without straining the existing infrastructure.

228 I think you should put the raised parking structure to the north of the facility at the North Kirkland Community Center site. I do not agree with tearing out more forested areas to do building. I also think it would be disruptive and ugly to build at the Juanita Beach site.

Traffic on Juanita Drive and NE 124th is already a nightmare. Adding more traffic will greatly impact the neighborhoods!

234 I love the idea of extending and improving the NKCC. The only concern is if there would be enough space for the facility including pool, walking/jogging track, community fitness center...

235 Traffic congestion and parking availability

236 We Kirklanders love our trees. Just hoping to keep the environmental impact to a minimum.

237 JBP has terrible parking as it is. The parking layout was not well thought out so it's congested and the spaces are too small. Would a parking structure be part of the plan??

238 The North Kirkland Community Center and Juanita Beach Park are the most central regional sites provided. Of these three options, the North Kirkland Community Center offers the easiest access to/from I-405 and provides the best opportunity for reviving the Totem Lake area. In full disclosure, our home borders South Norway Hill Park. Quoting city officials, the Kirkland Reporter made this location sound like it sits adjacent to Safeway and merely contains trees. On the contrary, it is several hundred yards away from Safeway and across a busy road. It sits in the middle of residential housing, nearly completely surrounded by single family homes, and not adjacent to commercial businesses. The land is connected to a much larger ecosystem of parkland and green space in which wildlife roam. A building and traffic of this magnitude will disrupt the residential neighborhood as well as the habitat of wildlife that moves from one green space to another. We know this to be true because from out of our family room window we are frequent witness to the animals living here. Just two weeks ago, in broad daylight we had a coyote in our backyard in South Norway Hill Park. In the last six months we have seen coyote, raccoon, deer, rabbit, and all kinds of birds including owls, eagles, woodpeckers, hawks, and falcons. In many ways, we would love to have a community center close to our home and it may even bring the promise of continual improvement in our area, but the costs must be carefully considered and the impact on neighbors should absolutely be paramount.

239 Adding traffic flow to the North Kirkland Community Center area is risky. NE 124th Street is very busy, on a hill, slippery in wet weather, and difficult to make a left turn onto. It does need additional traffic, especially that of cars filled with children. The Juanita Beach Park is also in an already high-traffic zone. I believe that adding a modicum of traffic to a more residential area like South Norway Hill would provide a greater safety factor, without unduly impacting the residential nature of the neighborhood.

- 266 Don't change the North Kirkland Community Center as it currently is - it is greatly used and the classes offered are not the same as any other locations I have known. I LOVE NKCC!
- 267 The space and parking at Juanita Beach. This area is already very crowded.
- 268 Normandy hill park too far from central Kirkland. Traffic and parking will be issues at all sites.
- 269 NKCC access from the freeway is quite slow during afternoon rush hour. So slow that I just avoid that area now. Juanita Beach may be no better. South Norway Hill Park seems awfully far north. I could probably get to the Bellevue pools faster. What about Totem Lake mall? Big 5 would love all the extra business of all those moms that forgot their kids goggles.

- 276 I wonder if NKCC would have enough parking spaces; seems that Juanita Beach has more of it.
- 277 Juanita Beach is a site that has a variety of uses in the open space by the baseball fields. There are few large open spaces for groups, families and teams to use on Finn Hill and in Juanita. This area should remain open. The congestion from the park in the summer is already difficult in terms of traffic on Juanita Drive.
- 278 N. Kirkland site would require a traffic light at that junction. It is already hard to turn left from the small streets onto 124th, both ways. Juanita Beach - too much traffic on 116th already
- 279 Space concerns for North Kirkland Community Center...I would like this location better but Juanita Beach seems like it would be better suited for a center (with a pool).
- 280 My biggest concern is that it would morph into a community play pool and not accommodate our Kirkland high school students with reasonable use times. We really owe it to our community to continue to provide for all kinds of competitive sports. My children are elementary school age and will likely be baseball/softball players, certainly not swimmers, but I still feel strongly that we need a competition size pool for the future of our community. We are in an economically stable enough area to create nice walk ways, trail projects, maintain good ball fields and support our schools both academically and athletically.
- 281 If it was at South Norway Hill Park I think it would be a bit far for us to drive to on a regular basis.
- 282 Norway hill is outer edge of kirkland. Either of other two sites is preferable.
- 283 The North Kirk Comm Center sounds very expensive. For Juanita Beach, I worry that it will be too crowded. The beach is already very popular, and I worry that adding an aquatic center will put too many desirable services in a single area that already has a huge number of users during the spring and summer season. While Norway Hill park is not as central as the other spots, I think it has room for managing the year round traffic. And if you make the place great, people will come. - 284 Losing outdoor playground for a parking area at NKCC. I'm concerned with the amount of trees you'd have to cut down at that other site.
- 285 I think funds should go towards remodeling and or building a new pool at Juanita High School.
- 286 Near by traffic and parking capacity
- 287 I would hate to take away all of the natural habitat at the South Norway Hill Park!
- 288 Traffic & parking.
- 289 I am not familiar with the South Norway location. If it were less expensive that dealing with the North Kirkland site, that would be good. My concern with Juanita Beach is parking and congestion.
- 290 Warm indoor pool will be great!

- 292 Traffic would be horrible at Juanita beach, its already bad at 116th intersection during commute time and this would add more.

- 298 Removal of baseball fields at Juanita Beach. Those are important to the community and are heavily used. I worry about wanting everything and not getting anything. We need to understand the priorities and come up with two options. One that includes everything, and one that includes the "must haves."

- 300 South Norway hill is not central to the city. Juanita site conflicts with the open space next to the lake and traffic congestion during commute hours. The NKCC is central, on a corridor that can support traffic, and would be adjacent to an indoor facility that can further develop as a community complex. This site is also central to many LWSD schools that serve citizens of Kirkland.

- 318 Cutting down trees at the South Norway Hill Park Current heavy traffic at Juanita Beech Park
- 319 I'm not concerned about those 3 sites. I do know, though, that the existing Peter Kirk Pool location was suggested to be kept in the running, by getting rid of the outdoor pool and only having the indoor facility My biggest concern is that we DO NOT lose our outdoor pool!!!! This is our second home in the summer - a huge part of our family's life - we swim there every day in the summer. We would not do the same, in the summer, with an indoor pool.

The most important thing to me is that the site selected be able to support a forward thinking facility, that has more than a very basic 6 lane 25 yard pool. An aquatic center as proposed by the WAVE aquatics committee with a large competition pool as well as satellite pools for other recreational use, or a facility like the one in Lynnwood would be a huge benefit to the greater Eastside community. The Lynnwood Aquatic Center routinely turns people away during open swim, because they are already at capacity. This is a demand that a center in Kirkland could easily meet. With regards to selection, I am in favor of whichever location would best support a more comprehensive facility.

326 Juanita Beach area congestion to an already very congested area for traffic, especially during summer time. Getting traffic out of Juanita can be challenging, and any added activities to that area greatly affects the flow.

327 Traffic traffic traffic

328 North Kirkland Community Center site seems to hilly to be able to accommodate a large pool.

329 South Norway Hill - this site would only make sense to me if there was a partnership with an entity on the northern border of Kirkland. However, more importantly, I would hate to lose the trees in this neighborhood. Juanita Beach Park - 1) I don't want to lose the large open green space which is now surrounded by new high rise condos. My preference would be to follow the park master plan design phases that will incorporate a skate park, ball fields, community gathering space, etc. 2) Traffic impacts will continue to grow as the new condos are occupied, building a recreational facility on this property will only add to the congestion. 3) Other than Marina Park (which is at capacity during the summer months), Juanita Beach Park is the only other viable option for holding large special events. Losing the open lawn space and restricting the timeframe in which an event can occur, due to facility programming, would negatively impact Kirkland's ability to recruit and/or retain certain types of events. Losing Juanita Beach Park as an event site would severely limit any potential growth of Kirkland's Special Events Program.

338 Juanita Beach Park is already inundated with people, parking is already difficult. Adding a facility such as this to that area would make it near impossible to access. South Norway Hill Park is not what I consider "Kirkland", it seems like that would be more of a Bothell facility than a true Kirkland facility. North Kirkland Community Center is perfect, though. Great location, still close to Juanita High School and accessible for many people.

339 Traffic impact especially from 100th behind the condos down to spuds.

340 I wonder if the traffic getting in and out of the Juanita Beach Park would be a problem.

341 If one of the goals is to house the adult volleyball program at this site, there should be at least 4 courts in order for the size of the leagues to stay the same - 8 teams playing on 4 courts. Ideally there would be 8 courts for 16 teams which is the number of women's teams which plays on Monday night between the Kamiakin Junior High and Emerson HS locations and from the two divisions - upper and lower. Potentially, the two divisions can move to different nights so that 8 teams play each night. If you make each division smaller than 8 teams each, the competition gets very boring and it makes it harder to get into a league that is already busting at the seams every season, which disappointed teams on waitlists all the time.

- 1 With the possibility of having community accessible meeting areas, rooms, then will an appropriate kitchen be installed? That is to say, would it be a stainless steel industrial type kitchen requiring a person/persons to have an up-to-date Safety Food License? Or, would it be solely basic without a stove, oven, heavy duty sink, etc.? A large refrigerator, freezer, ice machine, sink with food disposer, dishwasher, washing and drying machines and a potable water access for large requests like a filling a 5-gallon cooler with water for gatorade, lemonade, etc. vs. using custodial area sinks for filling such items? How would it all be maintained? Who is responsible? Would rental of these facilities by the community be a financial help to the maintenance of the property? How much liability insurance will be needed to cover this property?
- 2 I would love to see this more as a youth sports training facility - a "kids gym", if you will. There should be a 50 meter competition pool, a lesson pool, along with group exercise and weight training facilities to support out of the water training for swimmers. The facility could also be used for other sports teams, or individuals, to train for their specific sports. The city could really take this opportunity to be at the forefront of this, and offer training classes or sessions with trainers certified in working with kids and adolescents.

- 4 Overall, I think all of the facilities options you listed would be great. It would be awesome to have one facility that included pools, weight rooms, party space, etc. However, I think the MOST important thing is the largest size pool. All of the other options (weights, tracks, event rooms, etc.) are easily found elsewhere, and/or are easier and less expensive to build, relatively speaking. Large pools that are open to the community are not easy to find, and are very expensive to build and maintain. It's remarkable to me just how many different teams and organizations use the Juanita Pool for meets, practices, and lessons. The demand is high, and the options are minimal. We live in an area where it's particularly important that everyone learn how to swim, being so close to Lake Washington and the Puget Sound, where water recreation is common. We should also have a pool to support swim instruction, as well as year-round water recreation and competition.
- 5 Without an available pool, swim lesson programs and high school programs will disappear, leaving a community of many more non-swimmers. Growing up not knowing how to swim is extremely dangerous, and it is vital that children and high schoolers can practice swimming.
- 6 I think there needs to be at least a 50 m pool plus an additional warm water pool for kids swim lessons and therapy.
- 7 why not the big empty space east side of 405 (totem lake mall - where 24 hour fitness is) ? That is such a wasted area with few merchants ever lasting. Again 50 Meter pools
- 8 Please take into consideration that our community deserves an aquatics center that will accomodate all of the above requirements. Being in the Pacific Northwest with our rainy weather it will be very nice to have a covered pool that can accomodate all of the activities that make our lifestyle here what it is.
- 9 Is the Saint Edward's Park pool facility an option for a development site? The location seems ideal for an extensive Community Center development.
- 10 I think the Juanita / North Kirkland area has the population density to support a state-of-the-art facility, and I trust the people in the community to use the facility extensively, properly, and safely. Plus, this area needs something to differentiate itself ... I fully support our neighborhoods setting the standard for the rest of Western Washington and creating and maintaining a facility that we can be proud of for generations!

When my boys were little the only places for classes was a pool in Lake City, Gold Creek, and Juanita Beach. See pictures at <http://www.swimastoria.com/index.htm> and http://www.swimastoria.com/index_files/Page383.htm. We believe that the City of Kirkland lacks covered areas of recreation that can be used year-round by people of all ages. Specifically, the downtown area needs a covered pool and indoor recreation center. The current outdoor pool is just not very practical in the rainy Northwest. For the past 7 years, we have vacationed near the OR coast. We always make a stop at the Astoria Aquatic Center in Astoria, OR. The citizens of Astoria (not a wealthy community in terms of \$) passed a bond measure that funded the most fun and practical pool facility we had ever seen. People of all ages enjoy themselves. Similar to the Astoria Aquatics Center, we would like to see the following features at an Indoor Recreation Facility in Kirkland: A 25-yard lap pool with at least six lanes—This main pool would be used for swimming lessons, lap swimming, swim teams, therapy swim, and water aerobic classes. The shallow end would be 3½ feet deep and the deep end would be deep enough to allow diving off a diving board. To meet the needs of people of all ages, swimmers can enter the pool by stairs or a handicapped lift. The temperature would be maintained at 84 degrees. A second pool with a water slide and a lazy river—This pool would be used for play. Swimmers could go down a 105-foot open slide with a 20-foot drop. Or they could enjoy moving with the current in a C-shaped river. Or they could play with the different waterspouts and waterfalls. This pool's depth varies from 1½ feet to 5 feet. The water temperature would be warmer at 88 degrees. A spa pool—This pool overlooks both pools and can be used only by adults (limit is 10). Its water temperature is a steady 100 to 102 degrees. A fitness room and an outdoor covered area for basketball and/or volleyball games—Teen-agers and adults would benefit from these recreational choices. We think that just a roof with open sides would be adequate for those people wanting to play basketball or volleyball. All members of the Kirkland community would benefit from having year-round access to regular exercise at a centrally-located public facility. The Kirkland schools do a great job of challenging our children's minds. However, we believe that we could be better at providing more fun exercise opportunities. For example, the current summer program of swimming lessons is too short to teach children how to swim. We live near Lake Washington; all children should have the opportunity to learn about water safety and how to perform basic swimming strokes. Similarly, Kirkland has many adult and senior citizens who would benefit from water aerobics classes and open lap-swimming times. - 26 What about sites in the commercial area that are the current City Works Maintenance Yard near the Cross Kirkland Trail? or the old Municipal Court Building?
- 27 Thank you for taking the need for an indoor pool facility seriously. All the public pools in this area are closing down and no one seems to care that the only groups building facilities are private clubs. Access to year-round aquatic facilities shouldn't be limited to private club members.
- 28 I live in Edmonds and am a competitive member of Masters Synchronized Swimming, and a member of NEO (North End Otters - Masters Swim Team) I work out regularly at the Lynnwood Pool, and the Synchro team practices on Mercer Island - a marginally adequate facility for our practices. It is very difficult to find pool time at an affordable price, given so few pools in our area. I am also guardian for a young woman who competes in Special Olympic swimming, and again, very little practice time is available to her, so we supplement that two months of swimming on our own. I am also paying a coach to swim with her once a week. There are very few opportunities for her to swim without one on one supervision.
- 29 There are so few good pools in the Pacific Northwest. I would love to see this be a 50 meter pool with lots of options for swim teams, meets, families, etc. The aquatic center in Kelowna, BC is a fantastic example. Great use of space - absolutely loved how this facility was designed. <http://www.h2okelowna.ca/> A raised indoor running track that circles the entire facility (near the ceiling) would give soggy Seattle runners a great way to jog indoors and keep an eye on all activities.
- 30 To meet the demands of the swimming and fitness community, there is a need for a 50 meter pool with a warm water teaching pool,
- 31 I feel we really need a place for kids to learn how to swim and participate on a swim team. Those are my highest priorities. Ability to swim and take part in the sport of swimming is something we want to offer for our community and not just for people who can afford a private club. Swimming is a lifelong skill, wholly different from other sports in that way. It is not only a safety issue, it is also therapeutic and a great way to exercise for older adults.
- 32 My family loves to swim but there is only one all-season / indoor semi-public pool near us (Redmond Pool) and it's over-scheduled and it's a ridiculously small pool. There are a couple of private club pools but we can't justify the membership rates. My daughter loves to train & swim competitively but has had to drop it because the hours of availability at Redmond clash with her high-school work load. My 13 yr-old son would love to play in a pool on a regular basis, but there are no public / indoor free-play pools. My wife and I would love to swim laps to keep fit (can't run because of knee issues), but the only adult swim times are middle of the day when we're at work. Learning to swim should be a basic public safety requirement for all school children, but now I see that this is ignored here because there are not enough pool facilities. For adults wanting to keep fit, swimming is a much safer (riding on roads here to get to the bike paths is dangerous) and healthier alternative (running has damaged my knees). Opportunity? One pool-based facility that should be very popular here could be a ski / snowboard training slide. I think a ski slide jump that launches kids into a pool would be a great way to help aspiring ski-cross / half-pipe skiers and snow boarders practice their jumps. With these sports now in the Winter Olympics and with such great ski facilities nearby, a pool-based facility would be a perfect year-round training facility for these sports - and an exciting spectacle for viewers from say an over-looking cafe to watch.
- 33 Partnering with the state to update the dormant pool in St. Edwards State Park is another option. There is also already a gymnasium, meeting rooms and a giant vacant monastery building there.
- 34 The community needs a 50 meter pool! Preferably in association with a smaller warm pool for kids' lessons, water aerobics, etc.
- 35 I belong to a masters team in Shoreline (North End Otters) and we have many members who live in North Seattle, Shoreline and Edmonds. It wouldn't hurt to reach out to these areas. We could all benefit from a 50 meter pool on the East Side! Beats going to Colman or Federal Way! Thanks for your efforts. I have passed this along to our team.

The community needs space in the water. It would be nice to have at least a few rooms for parties and such in support of the water areas.
- 41 to meet the demand in our community, a 50 meter pool and at least one warm water teaching pool are needed.
- 42 Kirkland definitely needs an competitive indoor pool
- 43
I believe a 50m training pool and warm water teaching pool would be needed to meet the current needs of our high school and club swimmers in the area. Currently 3 high schools use the Juanita pool and this requires the swimmers at some schools to swim at 5:00 in the morning or late into the evening. A 50 m pool would allow more teams to use the pool simultaneously. It would also allow more master's swimming groups and adult water fitness groups to use the pool at the same time to allow different levels of swimmers access to the pool. Currently, there is only space for one high level masters group. I personally have watched 2 pools close in the area (Northshore pool and St. Edward's pool) and lose the master's programs and the swimmers who attended them. My children have learned to swim at Juanita pool, A warm water training pool would be a great addition to the 50m training pool. I have been put on waiting lists for classes at Juanita, so I'm sure there is demand and know the program is well run. I have been at Juanita and observed several groups trying to use the pool simultaneously; synchronized swimming, swim teams, water polo and learn to swim programs. It seems like it is bursting at the seams with users. Some programs are forced to use the pool late into the evening and extremely early in the morning due to lack of space. It would be a wonderful gift to our current and future swimmers to have adequate space for all users at reasonable times during the day.

Priorities for thinking into the future: 1.Aquatics Center - solve recreational use, all ages aquatics center and competitive center 2.Rental facility usage - revenue to maintain the center 3.Family Rec Center - solve cross uses for full family usage (small gym, rooms for fitness classes, climbing pinnacle, etc.) Let the community run the center. Lynnwood gets the gold start in customer service and schedule management of their facility. My family has used the pool as a destination pool as well as for birthday parties. All interactions have been positive and the staff gets an A+ in service. Consider splitting the building into two and putting the Aquatics Center at Juanita Beach site and the Family Rec Center with rental usage at North Kirkland Community Center.
- 49 Given the choice between an 8 lane, 25 yard pool and no pool at all, the 8 lane pool is much preferred. However, to meet the demand in our community, a 50 meter pool and at least one warm water teaching pool are needed.

I swim for Inglemoor Highschool, and being on the team was a great experience for me. My friend is the founder of the girls water polo team. All of the students involved with the aquatics programs at Inglemoor are very passionate about the sports they play and love participating. If the team were to be dissolved, I would be extremely disappointed, because the swim team is a valuable asset for the high school and an enjoyable experience for everyone involved. The girls team placed 6th at 4a state, and the boys placed 11th. In addition to the effect on high school teams, many club swim teams are struggling to find locations for practices and competitions. I swim for the Northshore YMCA team in the highest practice group, and i love it. We recurrently hosting meets at Kamiak high school because our practice pool does not meet competition regulations and we can't install starting blocks in the pool. Other club teams are struggling more than we are to find competition venues. Teams are rapidly filling, and if a pool isn't established to replace Juanita, not only the high schools, but the club teams in the area as well will be forced to disband. Locations for child swim lessons to be taught will also shrink. I believe it is very important for a quality pool to be established in this area in order to prevent the sport of swimming from dying out in this area. I am very glad this issue is being taken seriously, and appreciate the effort being made to preserve swim programs in this region. I hope we can find a way to fix this situation. Thank you!

We live in Redmond, but will be donating our own money to support this new pool.
- 75 Our city is already well under the national average for available square feet of water for our size. Simply replacing Juanita with a new facility of the same size will not help our city to make water time available to our residents. Instead, we need a facility or more than one facility so our available water will increase. We should not be turning away families that want their kids in swimming lessons because we do not have enough public water time available. A 50 meter facility can serve many groups at the same time and will increase the amount of water available to our residents. If a 50 meter facility is not possible, then we need to consider multiple 8 land 25 yard facilities so we can make water more available. Please do not try to add banquet facilities, gym, tracks, weight rooms, etc to the pool facility as it simply increases costs and we already have facilities in the city to meet these needs. We need to focus on meeting the need that we have, which is lack of water.

I think that building a pool is such an important thing for the community. We've been attending lessons and open swim and swim camp at Juanita High for just over a year now. We came to this pool because our previous swim program lost the lease on its pool and was forced to move all of their more advanced classes to downtown Seattle. As I looked at options for swim classes it became apparent that the most of the options were either membership-based (YMCA, Columbia Athletic) or seasonal (Kingsgate, Peter Kirk) or high-priced private companies (7-Cs.) Juanita High was a great find - year round lessons, open swim availability. We're only there a couple times a week, and we see all sorts of groups using the pool - swim teams, synchro, scuba, senior citizen exercise groups. It would be a shame to make all of these groups homeless. For a new facility my biggest desires would be - -- Having a warm water pool for babies and young kids. JHS is so cold! --Sufficient lanes so that both swim team and the more advanced Wave classes can practice. Currently evening Wave classes only use the shallow end, so the kids never get to practice diving or experience the deeper water. --Family friendly locker room facilities - I see parents struggle with this all the time. One mom I know has to change her boys in the car because they're too old to be in the women's locker room but aren't ready to be independent yet.

88 I'll be very happy to have a good swimming pool so it can be used for educational purposes, but I think Kirkland needs also a recreational aquatic center.. Our open park spaces are VERY PRECIOUS! The adopted City of Kirkland's Climate Action Plan lists these items: "Adopt and enforce land-use policies that ... preserve open space...." "Maintain healthy urban forest by promoting tree preservation and planting to increase shading, mitigate stormwater runoff, and absorb carbon dioxide." Proposing to use any of the 3 above-mentioned parks for this facility goes against these adopted city policies. Your proposal of using South Norway Hill Park, which has a very high-value functioning forest with over 50% native tree canopy and relatively low level of invasives, (see "South Norway Hill Park Forest Assessment" dated 2/13/14 by Klemm and Rodman) is especially unconscionable as this forest would be completely destroyed to accommodate the aquatics facility. Very few forested, or even open-space, parcels are left to acquire for park purposes within Kirkland any more. What we do have needs to be protected from "development" which decreases canopy or open areas ammenable to habitat restoration. If an aquatics facility is to be built, it should be sited on already developed land that is not designated as park land and that would not require destruction of forest or park open space. The swimming community should be willing to wait if such land is not currently available, rather than destroy park land.

141 Please build a pool! We need a competitive pool for swim teams and a rec pool for kids!

142 This would be a tremendous community asset. Let's get it done!

143 By leveraging either the sites at Albertson's on 132nd or redesigning Totem Lake Mall, Kirkland could attract money and businesses to these underserved northern neighborhoods and build something as good as the new Lynnwood pool (which is what we should be aspiring to). Please don't build a pool or choose a site that's "good enough." Pick a site and a design that will draw visitors to the area for years to come. - 154 Cities have repeatedly abandoned the plans for a community pool because of the cost, but the estimated cost is grossly overstated by the additional facilities that are added to the plan. Our city already has banquet facilities, running tracks accessible at schools, school fields, meeting rooms, etc that meet the needs of the community. Please consider that the need we are trying to meet by building a pool is simply the need to provide an aquatic facility for learn to swim programs, rehabilitation programs, competitive swim programs, water polo programs, etc. We do not need to duplicate facilities that are already available in our community. It is the aquatic facility that is not available. Please also consider that an indoor pool can service nearly 100% of the community, while additional soccer fields or ballfields can only service a very small percentage of the community and those facilities are already available while an aquatic center is not. Please also consider that a large pool (i.e. 50 meters) can service several groups at the same time, while a smaller pool cannot. Finally, it is the special pool features such as a lazy river or slides that cause increased insurance costs and maintenance. These features sound nice, but are not practical in delivering an aquatic facility at a reasonable price that meets the needs of the majority of our community. Please build a pool. Kids need to learn to swim, elderly can use it to exercise, the physically challenged can use it to exercise, the injured can use it for rehabilitation, youth can use it for training in competitive sports, masters can use it for training in competitive sports and the entire community can use it 365 days a year for a healthier lifestyle.
- 155 Thank you for sending this out to gather thoughts, questions and concerns. Your time is very appreciated. Please take everyone's responses into true consideration, this will build community support.
- 156 I am very glad the city is considering the recreational pool option. I have visited the facility in Lynnwood often and wished we had something similar in Kirkland. It is such a great outing to keep the kids moving on those long summer months. I think a city pool could be a great asset for our town, and with the addition of swimming instruction and availability of use for school teams and competitions it can be a great community builder too. Thank you for taking the time to gather input from the community!

I heard that the Peter Kirk pool may be converted to an indoor facility as a temporary replacement during construction. I just want to be sure we will not lose that as an outdoor pool. I took lessons there as a kid, and my kids take lessons every summer, and it would be a shame to lose one of the only outdoor pools anywhere in the area.

165 The North Kirkland Community Center and Juanita Beach Park sites are already established as community gathering places. The surrounding roads and residents are accustomed to traffic to these sites. The land for these 2 options are largely cleared and ready for construction, causing minimal disruption. With Juanita High School losing its aquatic facilities, it is beneficial to have an aquatic center built in the close proximity made available with the North Kirkland Community Center proposed site.

166 Thank you for your hard work in evaluating sites suitable for an aquatic facility.

167 The NKCC site is the most centrally located, is on several bus lines, and has two large arterial roads to access it, the best of all 3 sites. It is already partially developed and land that would be converted to the pool building currently is parking lot and grass, not forested area. A pool at Juanita Beach Park would convert grass, trees and baseball fields to a building and parking lot. Norway Hill would convert a forest to a building and parking lot. It is at the far northeast corner of Kirkland, the least central of all 3 sites. NKCC to me is by far the best choice.

You should consider crowd sourcing for financial support of the aquatic center. For example, we would be very open to the idea of paying, let's say 5k, for lifetime family membership with pool access and maybe 10k for lifetime membership with access to all center facilities (if it includes classes and other facilities like our North Kirkland Community Center). Ideally those memberships should be transferable. I think you will find enough interested families to support the project.

Dear Mrs. Walen,

My name is Andy Kispert and I'm a long-time Kirkland resident (relatively speaking) of 18 years. My wife Alice and myself are in the process of raising my son Ethan and my daughter Erin in the downtown Kirkland area. Ethan has turned 14 this year and is a year-around competitive swimmer while my daughter, turning 13 is a competitive gymnast. The reason I'm sending you this email is to express my support for the Juanita Beach Park to be a candidate location for a new Aquatic Center.

I have been taking my son to swim meets now for the past 4+ years and have driven many miles (and sat for many hours) to meets in various locations. The competitive swim season consists of basically two halves, the first being the Short-Course Yards (SCY) half taking place from October - March and the second half being the Long-Course Meters (LCM) half taking place from April - July.

The SCY season consists of meets taking place in pools measured in yards and is typically a 25 yard configuration, i.e., the competitive lanes run for a length of 25 yards. The LCM season consists of meets taking place in pools measured in meters and is typically a 50 meter configuration.

Aside from the challenges of the site preparation and construction of a year-around Aquatic Center, I tend to agree with the representatives from Wave Aquatics that a 50 meter complex would be the best solution rather than building another 25 YD pool. Here are my reasons for the site location and the choice of a 50 meter complex:

1. There are only 3 50 meter pools in the entire Seattle area. One in Federal Way (King County Aquatic Center), Colman Pool (West Seattle) and the other in Port Orchard. Having a 50 meter complex in Kirkland would equal out the distribution of available pools that can be used for LCM season training/meets. Additionally, during SCY season, 50 meter pools are typically divided into 2 25 YD lengths (with some left over) supporting multiple use by both teams and non-team swimmers.
2. Meter pools are used for Olympic Trials and for international competition. By Kirkland having a 50 meter state of the art complex, Kirkland could possibly be chosen as a location to host such trials or national/international competition. As you can imagine, this would raise the visibility of Kirkland even higher than it is today as great place to live and for supporting various sports activities. We already have numerous little league ball fields, football fields, etc. We could now say we host a year-around swim facility that can be used by anyone, from kids

learning how to swim to a training facility that can support elite athletes to seniors that need aquatic exercise year around.

3. One thing I've learned from attending many meets at the King County Aquatic Center, is that in addition to plenty of parking easily accessible on foot, you need places for athletes and their parents to go in between events in order to eat, or even head back to a hotel to rest, etc. The Juanita Beach Park area provides this, both in terms of parking available in the Beach Park itself and across from the park where the softball fields currently reside. In addition, Juanita provides numerous restaurants easily reachable on foot from the beach park. Those with vehicles might even venture to downtown Kirkland to eat.
4. Having a year-around 50 meter swim complex at Juanita Bay Beach Park would be a definite boom to the businesses in Juanita and downtown Kirkland. Swim meets, attract quite a few people, as you might guess, for regional level meets, some travel as far away as Alaska, Idaho, Montana, etc. Having both parking and places to eat both within a very short walking distance would be a boom to businesses both in the Juanita Village area and to downtown Kirkland. It might spawn the need to build another hotel in the Kirkland area.

Although a lot of my points from above tend to be focused around swim teams and competition (naturally due to my son being in the sport), there are lots of other groups that will be served through Kirkland having a new year around pool. We have a growing number of seniors that choose to make Kirkland their home and would definitely benefit from aquatics-based exercise. We also have a growing population with new families moving to the Kirkland area all the time and as such teaching water safety along with swimming lessons is, in my humble opinion, a must for living around so much water, i.e., Lake Washington, Puget Sound, etc. And last, but certainly not least, having a year around complex would be nice for being able to fool around in a pool in the middle of the winter time, i.e., quality family time, etc.

I sincerely hope the Juanita Bay Beach Park turns out to be a viable candidate for a location to construct a 50 meter swim complex as I believe it affords the best location for the above reasons.

We have also swam in the past at Redmond Pool--across from the HS. As well, the City of Kirkland pool (city swim team)

All these pools, in the last 8 yrs, have been used by my young family.

I am all in favor of a local, year-round, public pool.

But, please, do not put it on the northside of Evergreen Hill neighborhood, as Toby Nixon suggested. I like Toby well enough, but really? We need ANOTHER pool in the Kingsgate area? They have 4! If you add Woodmoor's pool into the equation, there are 5 pools all up there! AND, it is hardly accessible to all of Kirkland, or exclusive to it. If Kirkland is

Dear City Council Members,

In the Kirkland Reporter there was an article about possible locations for an indoor pool. I would like to share my thoughts on what one of the main priorities should be.

Please think carefully about the location in regards to transportation. One of the main problems with the St Edwards pool was that it was too far away from public transportation and not very accessible from the freeway or the Kirkland downtown core.

It seems to me, that this may have been one of the reasons it was underutilized.

I regularly use the pool at the Northshore YMCA and have noticed that it can't meet the demand for lessons, aqua classes, and swim team. This is especially true since many of other public pools in the area have had to close. Juanita pool has been under some of the same demand. With its closure there will be a great need for a pool that can be used for swim team and recreational activities by students in the Lake Washington School District. Kirkland students at Lake Washington, Emerson, International Community and Juanita high schools as well as those at Finn Hill, Kamiakin and Rose Hill Middle Schools will benefit by the addition of a new indoor public pool located in Kirkland.

The main buses that go near several of those schools are the 234, the 255, and the 245. Because of this, I believe that any pool should be along these bus routes or near a major transit station connecting to these routes. Also, a new pool should be easily accessible by car from downtown Kirkland because many parents with young children or adults exercising after work will have to drive there. Of the sites mentioned in the article, the North Kirkland Community Center property seems to have the best location for easy access by bus. It can also be reached by car from the 405 freeway and from downtown Kirkland via Market Street. Perhaps other locations will be suggested in the future and I believe one of the main deciding factors should be bus accessibility and whether or not a large parking lot can be built. When families participate in swim meets they will most likely drive. Many arterials don't allow street parking; therefore, adequate parking needs to be provided on-site when a public pool is developed. At the Northshore YMCA the parking lot can totally fill up at certain times of day and people are forced to park at neighboring commercial properties. Some of the people that need parking the most are families with young children attending swim lessons and the senior citizens taking water exercise classes. So even though I'm suggesting that locating a pool near bus routes that are accessible to high school students is important, I also realize that most people will access a pool facility by car.

Kirkland City Council Meeting, March 4, 2014 Items from the Audience – Marilee Henry

How do you do? My name is Marilee Henry, I'm a Green Kirkland volunteer for the Green Kirkland project. I wanted to speak on the issue of the proposed siting of an aquatic center.

I want to you consider rejecting the basic assumption that seems to be made that this aquatic center must be sited and built by 2017 which therefore requires that the facility be sited on land already owned by the city,

I.e., sacrificing one of our parks. I feel that our open spaces are extremely valuable and there are very few parcels remaining within our city limits that can be used as parks therefore any use of them should be very carefully be considered.

The City of Kirkland Council has adopted a climate action plan whose goal is stated as “to protect and enhance our natural environment for current residents and for future generations.” And that plan lists as actions: Adopt and enforce land use policies that preserve open space, and maintain healthy urban forests by promoting tree preservation and planting to increase shading, mitigate storm water run-off and absorb carbon dioxide. It seems to me that siting a large aquatics facility and parking garage on one of our parks is going against these stated goals and actions.

In particular, South Norway Hill Park has been evaluated in Kirkland’s forest restoration 20 year plan as being a very high value forest. Which means that it has over 50% tree canopy of evergreens including, Doug fir, western hemlock and red cedar that are 100 years old, or more. And it has an extremely healthy understory; salal takes many decades to grow to the height that it is in this area.

Juanita Beach Park has already has had great efforts and great expense gone into restoration. I know because I’ve spent many hours taking care of the plants that have gone into the restoration of Juanita Beach Park. And I think that the number of hours that our volunteers put in to restoring natural habitat and the number of citizen volunteers that come from corporations and neighborhoods – they put in hundreds of hours toward restoring our natural habits in our parks. And I think that the value of these open spaces and our forests should not be taken as anything less and are probably greater than what would be gained by putting a swimming facility in this area and I implore you to reject that we have to do this so quickly that we have to sacrifice a park.



- ▶ *Despite only moderate awareness (37%) of the potential Juanita High School pool closure, most (82%) favor building a Kirkland indoor community recreation and aquatic center to replace the Juanita High School pool and three quarters (75%) say they would support a bond measure for a new facility.*
- ▶ *When asked about potential components of a new facility, a teaching pool for learning how to swim and water safety, lap pool for general swimming, and a pool that can be used for High School competitions were seen as the most important priorities. Non pool related components like multi purpose rooms and community spaces were rated as lower priorities.*

Key Findings

- ▶ *Of the three sites tested, North Kirkland community center on NE 120th Street was the top first and second choice followed closely by Juanita Beach Park on the North Side. Respondents list accessibility, location, cost, as the most important factors to consider when choosing a site.*
- ▶ *By a 55% to 41% margin residents prefer moving “forward alone with a new indoor pool facility to ensure it is built quickly and located in Kirkland even if it means city residents will have to fund the whole cost” over “finding other Cities to partner with and share in the costs even if it means building an indoor pool facility will take longer and the facility might be located outside of Kirkland”.*

Quality & Availability Ratings

Most (78%) give positive ratings overall for the quality of parks and recreation system, but half (48%) are concerned about the availability of indoor recreation facilities and 60% are concerned about indoor swimming facilities in Kirkland







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Q5. Have you heard anything recently about a Kirkland Recreation and Aquatic Center?



Priorities for New Facility










Q26. Which of the following statements is closer to your opinion even if neither one is exactly right. Which statement is closer to your opinion?



This report provides information on two possible options for converting the outdoor Peter Kirk Pool facility from summer-only use to year-round use. We have provided information on installation of an inflatable "bubble" structure as well as the option to operate the pool as an uncovered, year-round heated outdoor swimming pool.

Background

The Peter Kirk Pool facility was opened in 1969, largely as a community volunteer-led response to Kirkland not being among the region's cities to receive funding from King County's 1968 Forward Thrust ballot initiative. The facility contains two pools: one is a 4,500 square feet, 6-lane, "L" shape pool with diving, and the other is a 780 square feet teaching/wading pool.

Since its initial opening the pool has undergone one major renovation, which took place in 1995. Completed improvements included new decking, bathhouse, guard shack, mechanical rooms, and control systems. In 2007, the Parks and Community Services Department commissioned a facility assessment which has resulted in on-going facility capital investments related to increasing accessibility and safety and ensuring compliance with applicable health codes and laws.

The facility is now open seven days per week for 13 weeks each summer and provides swim lessons, public swimming, water aerobics, water safety classes, lap swim, competition, rentals, school outings, and special interest classes for all ages. In 2013, staff recorded 17,600 pool visits. The pool operates as a cost-neutral facility, with revenues and expenditures of approximately \$280,000 annually.

Inflatable Structure Option

Inflatable structures (also referred to as air-supported or air-inflated structures) are most often dome-shaped structures used for warehousing, shelters, and sports and recreation facilities. Examples of local inflatable structures can be seen at Mercer Island Beach Club and Newport Hills Swim and Tennis Club in Bellevue.

Inflatable structures derive their structural integrity from the use of continuous internal pressurized air to inflate a pliable synthetic fabric envelope, so that air is the sole support of the structure, and where access is by way of revolving doors which serve as airlocks.

The structures must be secured by heavy ground weights, ground anchors or attachment to a foundation. An illustration showing installation of the grade beam foundation can be seen in Exhibit A, attached. Inflatable structures can be designed and installed as semi-permanent structures or can be "deflated" and removed as needed.

Purchase and Installation Costs

Based on discussions with product vendors, estimated purchase and installation costs for an air-supported structure that will cover both pool tanks are nearly \$500,000. Costs are detailed in Exhibit B, Table 1.

Operating Assumptions

Staff has prepared an operating model with the assumption that a covered Peter Kirk Pool would accommodate most existing programs at Juanita Aquatic Center, including open swims, lessons, rentals and Lake Washington and Northshore School District programs and teams. Under this model, the pool would be programmed 5:30 am to 10:30 pm, seven days a week for 26 weeks from early September to mid-March, allowing time in the spring for removal of the bubble and annual facility maintenance. The estimated cost to operate for 26 weeks during the fall and winter is estimated at \$367,000 and would be offset by an estimated range of \$342,000 to \$396,000, (mid-range is \$369,000) in new revenue, based on the City's current admission and rental fees. Operating costs and revenues are detailed in Exhibit B, Table 3.

No Cover Option

Another option developed by staff would be to operate the pool year-round without a roof cover. In preparing this report, staff found one facility that operates without a cover; the Samena Swim and Recreation Club in Bellevue. Samena has two pools, one indoor lap pool and one outdoor lap pool. Both pools are open year-round. According to the staff at Samena, the outdoor pool swims are well attended and weather conditions generally do not affect the number of users. They reported that many members join for the ability to swim in an outdoor pool year-round. Samena offers adult lap swim, recreation classes, fitness, swim team and triathlon training.

Facility Upgrade Costs

Under this option, the one-time costs would be limited to upgrading the deck lighting and purchase of canopies for on-deck instruction and the lifeguard station, for a total of approximately \$41,000 (see Exhibit B, Table 4).

Operating assumption

Based on the Samena operation without a cover example, it may be possible that in addition to the high school swim and dive teams use of the pool, and absent any other pool in the area, operating the pool at the same level as the covered pool may generate the same range of revenue between \$342,000 and \$396,000, shown on Table 3. Operating costs of \$379,400 (Table 5) are only slightly higher than for the covered pool due to increased utility needs.

Other Considerations

Providing year-round programming has several implications / considerations that should not be overlooked, such as:

- Parking Impacts – Peter Kirk Pool users are directed to utilize the Municipal Parking Garage below the Kirkland Library. Consideration of parking impacts should be explored.
- Neighborhood Impacts – Year-round use of the pool may have an impact on surrounding businesses and residences, particularly during early morning and late evening times which are desirable and necessary usage times for various pool user groups.
- Aesthetics – The aesthetics and view obstruction caused by an inflatable structure should be fully considered. An illustration of the covered pool is shown in Exhibit C.
- Excessive Facility Wear and Tear – Increased use of the pool facility will accelerate the need for major maintenance and replacement of pool facility components such as water pumps, filtration, and water treatment systems.
- Use – Although there are “bubbled” outdoor pools in the region, this would be a new experience for many pool patrons that swim at the Juanita High School Pool. It is unknown whether the participation in programs would be negatively affected.
- Lighting – Although the facility has pole lighting, the lights are rarely used in the summer. Summer hours are 5:00 am – 9:00pm. The no-cover option would require the deck lights to be on as early as 5:00 a.m. and as late as 11:00 p.m. In addition, the lighting may need to be upgraded to meet current standards for overhead illumination by the Health Department for lifeguards to clearly see the bottom of the pool. Should this option be considered, further analysis will be needed.
- Boiler- The current boiler is 44 years old and is scheduled and funded for replacement in 2014. Year-round pool use will affect the decision on the heating capacity of the replacement boiler. A upgraded boiler suitable for year-round use would cost \$10,000 more than the amount currently budgeted for boiler replacement.
