RECREATION DIVISION

- Recreation staff provided an array of highly valued recreation camps this summer with 1,445 campers taking part.
- The fall/winter brochure was delivered to homes mid-August and to-date staff has completed nearly 2,600 registrations, with 180 participants placed on waiting lists. Recreation Coordinators will adjust participant levels, where possible, based on the interest expressed.
- Great appreciation to Carly Parker, on-call Aquatics Coordinator, who did an excellent job in leading our Aquatics staff in a safe and successful summer season.

North Kirkland Community Center

- NKCC has had an extremely busy summer hosting the following day camps: Jump Rope Camp, Cheer Camp, six sessions of Preschool Theater camps, Animated Avatar Green Screen Video Camp, Lego® Pre-Engineering, FUNdamentals, and Bashem' Bots Camps, eight weeks of Preschool Giggles and Grins Preschool Camps and 10 weeks of our 10-hour Junior Camp. In addition, staff managed offsite camps including a weekly Rhythmic Gymnastics Camp, Yoga Camp, a two week science workshop and a week-long cooking workshop. A total of 539 children were registered in these City-sponsored camps administered by North Kirkland Community Center staff.
- A big thank you goes out to the four wonderful volunteers who logged a total of 143 hours helping staff provide activities and assistance managing summer camps.
- In addition to the busy day camps, NKCC was hopping offering on-going classes during the summer which included preschool music, guitar, piano, French for children and adults, preschool art, tumbling, Kids in Motion, cheerleading, hip hop, adult dance, and five days per week of preschool dance classes.

Aquatics/Youth Basketball

- Peter Kirk Pool ended another successful aquatics season on September 2nd. This summer, over 2,700 registrants participated in programs at the pool, generating over \$200,000 in revenue.
- Lifeguards at Juanita, Houghton and Waverly beaches also ended the season on September 2nd. Throughout the summer, lifeguards educated patrons on beach safety and swimming rules, provided lifejacket loaners to swimmers, made daily assists and rescues preventing life-threatening

situations from occurring, provided first aid as well as assisted with daily maintenance tasks such as ensuring the sand, docks, parking lots and grass were free of harmful objects and trash.

- Orca Swim Team had a successful season wrapping up on August 17th. The 182 member team finished the season with a championship meet at Yost Pool in Edmonds. Swimmers competed in their favorite events, swimming against all teams in the Craze Swim Team League.
- Registration continues for the 2013 Kirkland Kids' Triathlon being held on Saturday, September 14th. This non-competitive event provides an excellent opportunity for youth to experience the sport of triathlon. The Kids' tri is being put on by the City of Kirkland at Juanita Beach Park.
- Registration for City of Kirkland Youth Basketball is now open. Currently, 121 3rd-6th grade boys and girls are registered for the program which begins on December 2nd. Practice and games are held at local schools within Lake Washington School District.
- PeeWee Basketball registration is under way. This year, fall and winter sessions are being offered to children ages 3-6 on Saturdays beginning in late October. PeeWee Basketball is designed to develop and improve preschoolers' basketball skills and techniques. This program is a great first step into preschool sport!

Sports and Fitness

- The City's first-ever beach volleyball league concluded in August. The eight teams that competed had a great time playing volleyball on the new courts. Staff is looking forward to next year and anticipates a stronger demand to join the league.
- Summer/fall softball leagues are more than half way finished with their seasons. With 20 teams participating, maximum enrollment was met for two out of the three divisions. There are several local businesses participating this season including Cobalt Mortgage, Acropolis Pizza, Toyota of Kirkland, Life Care of Kirkland, Pinnacle Mortgage and BelKirk Body Shop, to name of few. The playoff tournaments for each division will begin the week of September 16th.
- Fall indoor volleyball leagues will begin on September 16th with 39 teams registered.
- The PeeWee Soccer league begins on September 14th with the mandatory coaches meeting set for September 4th. There are a total of 40 coaches volunteering their time to teach the 260 children enrolled to play on the fields at Emerson High School and 132nd Square Park.

Peter Kirk Community Center

- PKCC was closed to the public the last two weeks in August for maintenance. During the closure the building was painted inside and out, the hardwood floors were refinished, the carpet and all of the upholstery was cleaned. The staff worked at cleaning out all the storage closets and cupboards and sprucing up the lobby area.
- As advertised in the fall/winter brochure, a variety of new classes are being offered both during the day and in the evening and since registration began in mid-August, several of the PKCC van trips have already filled up and have waiting lists.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DIVISION

Youth and Human Services

- The Kirkland Summer Feeding program was operated from June 25th through August 27th and served lunch to over 450 kids at its two sites: 132nd Square Park and Juanita Beach Park.

MAINTENANCE DIVISION

Athletic Fields

- Lee Johnson Field – Spring and summer youth baseball wrapped up late July. Youth baseball has trickled down to just Saturdays and one game on Sundays (Kirkland Baseball Commission fall baseball program). However, slots are all but maximized as the Parks Department Recreation Softball Leagues play four games Monday through Thursday evenings and all day on Sundays. The only unfilled slot is Friday nights – all other Lee Johnson slots are booked solid!

- Crestwoods – Senior softball played the last of their season the first week in August, just in time for the switch to soccer. Lake Washington Youth Soccer Association is scheduled on all four fields weeknights and Saturdays. Soccer use at Crestwoods will run through early November.
- Everest – District 9's Junior Softball Little League World Series was a huge success! Everyone appeared to have an absolutely wonderful time. Hats off to our crew for their foundational involvement in providing a beautiful site for our local girls and those visiting from around the world. Kirkland American Little League and Northwest University both have fall ball programs that will run through approximately October 15th.
- Juanita Beach and 132nd Square Fields 2 and 3 are scheduled to Lake Washington Youth Soccer Association afternoons for soccer practices. 132nd Square Field 1 is scheduled to various select youth softball groups.
- City/School Partnership sites are scheduled to a variety of programs – football and soccer are the primary users. Youth baseball and softball are secondary.

Volunteers

- August 24th was the date of Northwest University culmination of freshman orientation, which was celebrated as a community service project at Juanita Beach Park. The event centered on control of the noxious weed purple loosestrife, beach clean-up of milfoil, and general weeding of the park. Participating in the event were 70 students along with a number of University staff and helping with the support of the event were three Parks Operations staff from the Horticulture crew and two seasonal staff. A considerable amount of work was accomplished as documented by the photos below:

Notes from the Field

- North Juanita Open Space received some healthy improvements in the months of July and August and there's more to come this fall. The combination of goats, mechanical removal and staff hauling out loads of debris has the site looking better. Staff hauled out truckloads of debris including: railroad ties, metal, tires, concrete chunks, a slide, bags of trash, lumber with nails and even a semi bumper!

- Early September rains have been beneficial to our Parks system giving the plants a needed drink of water.
- Peter Kirk Restroom continues to see progress. The contractor has started setting tile and installed new doors and restroom fixtures. It is estimated that the project will be completed this month. Pictures to follow in October.
- Some nice compliments have come in this summer about the Heritage Hall wedding experience. We are not wedding planners, but staff has done a great job helping customers on their special day. From the coordination to the gardens and lawn areas looking spectacular. Staff did a great job this summer.
- Everest Park received a new water line servicing the restroom and concessions buildings. The work was not anticipated. The 44 year old 2" galvanized line had corroded to the point of not providing adequate water flow to service all of the amenities at the buildings.

GREEN KIRKLAND PARTNERSHIP

- On July 20th, the Green Kirkland Partnership hosted an All-Steward Meeting at McAuliffe Park. 12 stewards gathered to hear updates from staff and to share their feedback for the program and ideas for 2014. The meeting also included an introduction and brief talk from Patrick Tefft and the unveiling of the Forest/Park Restoration h-stake signs that were created in collaboration with Forterra.
- In coordination with Parks Maintenance, the Green Kirkland Partnership will begin hosting volunteer events at the North Juanita Open Space. Currently 3 volunteer events have been scheduled for September 15th, October 5th and November 16th. Katie Cava, Green Kirkland Program Assistant, will be leading these events until a steward is recruited and trained.
- In July, the Green Kirkland Partnership launched its registration page which allows volunteers to register for individual or multiple events. See page at www.greenkirkland.org
- In July, Juanita Heights Park Steward, Kathy Schuler, began hosting monthly volunteer events from 9am-11am on the last Saturday of each month.
- On July 25th, staff conducted site visits to determine locations for professional crews to work September through November in the following parks: Kiwanis, Cotton Hill, Carillon Woods, Juanita

Heights and Watershed parks. We are fortunate to have the opportunity of professional crews paid through Forterra's federal grant, to work on steep slopes unsuitable for volunteers.

- Green Kirkland administrative volunteer Haley Jobes is helping with office work. Throughout the summer and into fall she will be working on compiling comprehensive lists of outreach contacts, supporting event publicity, and working with Stewards to improve their event signage.
- On August 8th, Forterra's Washington Conservation Corp visited Crestwoods Park to gather a second set of data for the monitoring plot established before the Pearl Jam restoration work began. In September, new monitoring plots will be established in 7 parks as part of Forterra's grant with the USFS.
- On August 9rd and 23rd, Green Kirkland Partnership hosted an outreach booth at the Juanita Beach Market. During these events we talked about restoration with community members, passed out information about native vs. invasive plants, and recruited volunteers for upcoming events.
- On August 15th, Juanita Bay Park GK stewards, Nona Ganz and June Fletcher, hosted a group of volunteers from Target in restoration activities. This is the second consecutive year that Target employees have volunteered at Juanita Bay Park.
- On August 22nd, Juanita Bay Park GK stewards, Nona Ganz and June Fletcher, hosted a group of 22 volunteers from AT&T and Landis + Gyr. Volunteers completed a large amount of maintenance weeding and had a great time.
- On August 24th, EarthCorps and the Green Kirkland Partnership hosted a volunteer event at Watershed Park. During the afternoon 114 volunteers removed Himalayan blackberry and yellow archangel to prep Watershed Park for Arbor Day in November. This event included 75 students from Northwest University who were participating in their school's Day of Service.
- The mapping of five new parks into habitat management units that began on June 14th has reached its final stage of edits. Draft maps have been shared with Tim Werner, Jennifer Schroder, Katie Cava, Collins Klemm, and Sharon Rodman.
- In August, Carillon Park Steward, Lisa McConnell, began hosting weekly volunteer events from 9am-10am that are currently focused on the maintenance of the natural area at the entrance of the park.
- Green Kirkland stewards continue to host recurring volunteer events in their respective parks:
 - Juanita Bay Rollers: 4th Saturday of the month events at Juanita Bay Park from 10am to 1pm
 - Juanita Heights Park: Last Saturday of the month at Juanita Heights Park from 9am-11am
 - Juanita Bay Park Volunteers: Thursday, 10am to noon at Juanita Bay Park
 - Highlands Neighborhood: Wednesday, 10am to 11am at Cotton Hill Park
 - Carillon Woods: Wednesday, 9am to 10am

Subject: Totem Lake Park Master Plan Draft Design Concepts

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Park Board review and provide input on draft design concepts to be further refined and presented to the community for evaluation.

BACKGROUND DISCUSSION:

The Totem Lake Park design program (Attachment D) was approved by the City Council at their meeting of August 6, 2013. The design program provides guidance and direction on development of a schematic design for the park.

Our design team, headed up by The Berger Partnership, is developing three concepts to be presented to the community on Saturday, September 21, from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

Concept A –

- Assumes no land acquisition
- Has a boardwalk system that circles more of the Lake
- A bird blind is included on the Northeast edge
- Includes features within the wetland to view habitat and for seating / amenities
- Enhances ecology by adding habitat features and/or hummocks to diversify plant species. Removes invasive species.
- Assumes a shared parking agreement with Yuppie Pawn and/or the mall property
- Connections to the community are identified
- Features along the CKC provide seating and areas to congregate. A bridge feature connects the KC property.
- Totem Lake BLVD is enhanced with a planting strip median

Concept B –

- Assumes acquiring the Yuppie Pawn parcel (upland parcel)
- A small parking lot is provided, along with a restroom / pavilion structure.
- Lawn areas are included at the upland parcel for picnics and passive recreation.
- Storm drainage structures could be incorporated below the upland parcel to help with water quality.
- Captures the corner of the Totem Lake Mall with a redeveloped retail / street connection to strengthen the connection to the hospital up 120th.
- Starts to build a promenade behind the B of A and restaurant space to provide a better edge to the lake.
- Has a boardwalk system
- The CKC is enhanced by an overhead spiral walkway feature and seating / small gathering areas
- The overhead spiral walkway has a sculptural ribbed overhead feature that provides opportunity for art (and is fully out of the SCL ROW).
- Loop is created around the lake by connecting boardwalks
- Habitat is enhanced with “nurse log” theme that provides habitat features and hummocks to diversify tree species.
- Invasive species are removed.
- Triangle at Totem Lake BLVD and 124th includes art installation and storm water feature.
- Totem Lake BLVD is enhanced with a planting strip median.

Concept C –

- Assumes acquiring both Yuppie Pawn and the Carlton Inn site
- Former Carlton Inn site is utilized for Storm Water Quality ponds that then flow into habitat feature ponds carved into the existing wetland to help diversify habitat (Pacific chorus frog).
- Promenade feature along the west side provides a terrace for a re-developed edge that promotes interaction with local businesses.
- Assumes utilizing street parking and the parking available at a re-developed Totem Lake Mall.
- Totem Lake Mall Parcel is redeveloped and includes a “green spine” connection from the property down to the lake edge promenade.
- Main upland parcel of the park is a terrace with a sculptural lawn space for passive recreation and includes a restroom / meeting space. (terminus to the green spine connection to the mall)
- Looping trail is completed by overhead walkway that connects to the CKC. Boardwalks are provided on the east property line.
- The CKC is enhanced by a boardwalk viewing platform and other secondary seating / gathering areas.
- The KC parcel is enhanced with a boardwalk and lawn area (or possible natural play elements?)
- The triangle area in at Totem Lake BLVD and 124th takes diverted storm water and includes controls to release water into the lake.
- Totem Lake BLVD is widened with an added planting strip between the roadway and sidewalk. Planted median included.

RESOLUTION R-_____

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF KIRKLAND RELATED TO ESTABLISHING A FORMAL DESIGN PROGRAM TO GUIDE CREATION OF A TOTEM LAKE PARK MASTER PLAN.

WHEREAS, in December of 2010 the City Council adopted Resolution R-4856, approving a Preliminary Action Plan for revitalizing the Totem Lake Business District and directing City departments to reprioritize work tasks accordingly.

WHEREAS, the Park Board in 2011 forwarded recommendations to the Council regarding potential park-related projects, including for the City to develop a master plan for the Totem Lake Park property; and

WHEREAS, the Urban Land Institute in 2011 also recommended that Totem Lake Park be developed as a catalyzing strategy along with development of the Cross Kirkland Corridor to help create a "sense of place" in Totem Lake; and

WHEREAS, in February 2013 the City Council formally adopted the City's 2013 – 2014 Work Program, which included emphasis on Totem Lake revitalization; and

WHEREAS, in March 2013 the City Council authorized funding for creation of a Totem Lake Park Master Plan and directed staff and the Park Board to work with the property owner King Conservation District and interested citizens in developing the Plan; and

WHEREAS, a Design Program should be established to guide schematic design and creation of a park master plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Kirkland as follows:

Section 1. That the Totem Lake Park Master Plan incorporates the following elements hereby referred to as the Design Program:

1. Provide a loop trail that enhances and energizes the site.
2. Provide appropriate amenities to support use of the site (benches, signage, environmental and historical interpretation, seating areas, etc.).

3. Enhance connectivity to and from the park, to include Evergreen Medical Center and the Totem Lake Transit Center. Develop connections in cooperation with Seattle City Light at the utility easement and with local property owners on the "north hill" to allow adjacent community users to access the site.
4. Study and recommend parking opportunities and improved pedestrian access.
5. Provide improved pedestrian connections at Totem Lake Blvd. and N.E. 124th Street.
6. Develop the Cross Kirkland Corridor to enhance the experience of Totem Lake Park and provide connections to surrounding businesses.
7. Study the development of an upland parcel or parcels for future community center, parking, and link to Totem Lake Mall properties.
8. Explore further how adjacent parcels could be re-developed to strengthen and support the programming of the park.
9. Enhance the ecological function of the park and the quality of water leaving the lake. Develop a vegetation and wildlife management plan that looks to diversify the existing vegetation, remove invasive species and support a diverse population of wildlife.
10. Make recommendations on how to improve water quality and how management of the site may help alleviate future flooding issues.
11. Consider how public art could be incorporated into the planning process to energize the site and create an awareness of the lake.
12. Develop and maintain views and access to open water but don't provide for boating activities due to the limited size of the lake.

Subject: Waverly Beach Park Renovation Project

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Park Board review input received from citizens at the August 20 park open house and provide input on draft design concepts to be further refined and presented to the community for evaluation.

BACKGROUND DISCUSSION:

On Tuesday, August 20 staff and our consultant team (Anchor QEA) hosted an open house at Waverly Beach Park to solicit feedback from citizens on renovation elements and priorities for the park. Participants were provided with graphics detailing existing conditions, opportunities, and possible constraints, as well as information about project goals and potential renovation elements (Attachments A and B) Information collected from the open house, attended by over 30 residents, is provided in Attachment C.

Based on site and design considerations as well as input received from the Park Board, staff, and the public, Anchor QEA has provided three draft design alternatives for the Board's consideration (Attachment D). A brief comparison of the alternatives is provided in chart form as Attachment E.

Staff and the consultant team will present the alternatives to the Board for review at your September meeting. We are scheduled to unveil the alternatives at the upcoming Market Neighborhood Association Annual Picnic, scheduled for Saturday, September 14, from 2 – 5 pm at Waverly Beach.

Park Character

1. Improve Park entry visibility from south approach on Waverly Way.
2. Provide clear identification of Park name and entrance location at main Park entry.

5. Improve quality of entry experience along driveway to upper parking lot entry.

1. Improve Park's entry driveway and parking lot safety to minimize vehicle pedestrian conflicts.
2. If possible, maintain current parking capacity.
3. Preserve maintenance parking stall and maintenance access driveway at pump station.

2. Create appropriate opportunities to better access and use the Park's lawn areas.
3. Take advantage of, protect, and enhance views and view corridors.
4. Support water-dependent, non-motorized recreation activities including launching and landing hand-carried boats and windsurfing.
5. Provide a safe and fun place for children's play, with opportunities for multiple ages of children.

5. Create shoreline riparian and hillside forest habitat restoration opportunities that can be implemented by a combination of community stewardship and contracting.

Members of the Public	Approximately 30 members of the public attended the open house and most provided comments. Names of participants were not collected, but included individuals, couples, and families. In general, it appeared that most participants were residents of the City of Kirkland.

I. PURPOSE OF MEETING

The open house meeting was held to introduce the public to the Waverly Beach Park (Park) Renovation Plan Project (Project). The intent was also to share the opportunities and constraints maps, preliminary Project goals, and design program, as well as to obtain any concerns and ideas for Park renovation. The meeting was held from 4:00 to 7:00 pm on a Tuesday, and weather conditions were sunny, with a normal summer level of weekday afternoon and early evening use. At the open house, one large tent was set up with three display tables and two easels with the opportunities and constraints, park survey, aerial photograph, copies of the preliminary goals, and design program. Copies of the latter two items were available for the public to take. Verbal comments from the public were recorded on two flip charts by Anchor QEA staff because there were often multiple citizens

commenting at the same time. The intent was to record all relevant public comments on the flip charts. The following is a summary of the public comments recorded on the flip charts. The comments are organized under the headings of Concerns, Potential Improvements, and Other Comments. These headings were added after the open house as a way of organizing the comments.

II. SUMMARY OF PUBLIC COMMENTS

A. Concerns

The following concerns were identified:

- The rocks are slippery
- The rocks on the beach are too big (Swimmer)
- There is no path to the beach
- Ice conditions on the driveway and lower parking areas are hazardous
- Off-site water drains down 6th Street to the entry and driveway, turns north, and misses catch basins
- Attention should be paid to the northerly long shore drift on the beach
- Muddiness on the south lawn limits use
- Odors (dead fish) occur in the swim area
- A buffer should be kept between the upper parking and play areas; parents want to see where their kids are (not have them go up where care are)
- Dogs should be kept on leashes and dog use should be limited
- There is more drug use and other illegal activity in the upper parking lot area than elsewhere
- Picnickers often use the vegetation along the south end of the lawn to dispose of food, charcoal and other waste; this creates a problem with both litter and scavenging wildlife
- Parties in the upper parking lot are a concern

B. Potential Improvements

The following potential improvements were identified:

- Waterslide/diving board off pier deck in swim area (2 comments)
 - Hot shower (or any shower) for swimmers to rinse off (3 comments)
-

- Bicycle parking
 - Easier hand boat launch spot, not necessarily closer
 - Camera, wind gage, or flags for sailors, kite boarders, and wind surfers
 - Wi-Fi
 - Load/unload parking near water
 - Decorative signage (perhaps identifying landmarks visible across the lake) with a nautical or beach theme
 - Kids' activities (find/build)
 - Picnic shelter and tables (2 comments)
 - More direct and convenient access for hand launched vessels
 - Storm drainage
 - Driveway and lower parking in southwest corner
 - Lower CBs in driveway, add one to two more at lower lot
 - Upper lot needs drainage in south end (southwest corner [dug trench]); drains down hillside to lawn
 - If subdrains, need to cover whole area
 - Pedestrian circulation
 - Separate pedestrians from cars
 - Improve swim area for small children (steps intimidating)
 - Better picnic facilities including more table and barbeques
 - Add barbeques with picnicking (2 comments)
 - Keep the gate at the south end
 - New swim beach: sand versus gravel-like sand
 - Like building play area into hillside
 - Drainage
 - South lawn fixable (soil)
 - Sometimes a problem in September
 - Springs – driveway
 - Improve pedestrian access at driveway
 - Connecting grass island to park is good
 - Roundabout at park entry
 - Motorized boat launch – move from Marina Park to here and expand parking capacity
-

- Dogs off-leash area – provide limited access early morning and late evening, or seasonal, K-Dog – provide stewardship
- A shower with hose for washing down vessels
- Fishing pier – limited space, not as safe as could be with more room (casting danger to kids)
- Revise lower parking lot with radial angle parking and island in middle
- Swim area
 - Steps on south abutment
 - Ladders – better traction (do not like rungs – tubes or pipes)
- Treehouse
- Waterslide
- Swim float
- Ropes course
- Upper parking lot lighting (discourage parties there)

C. *Other Comments*

The following other comments were made:

- Off-leash times and seasons
- Park has good shade and sun
- Lawn – get a lot of seepage from hillside
- How do bikes come in?
- Like to use park for morning swim for dogs
- Adding stairs from Waverley Way along south side of park OK, but should be well lit and respect privacy of adjacent neighbors

III. NEXT STEPS

The next public meeting is scheduled for **September 14, 2013**, and alternative designs will be presented at that meeting.

BACKGROUND DISCUSSION:



McPherson Property - South Rose Hill



Thank you for taking the time to talk with me and to visit the site we hope will become open space and/or park for our neighborhood. I am enclosing the petition signed by 220 neighbors, as well as a map which shows the property (highlighted in red) and the households that signed the petition (highlighted in green). We did not knock on every door, but I have no doubt many more people would have signed if we had.

Below is the information I shared with you that we would like the Parks & Community Services Department, as well as the Kirkland City Council to consider:

1. The land has been used by the neighborhood as a park for over 16 years, thanks to the generosity of the owner, John (Jack) MacPherson, who passed away this July.
2. The property qualifies for purchase via the recently passed Proposition 2 and the city's goals, as there is no park within 1/4 mile of the neighborhood.
3. With the drastic increase of development in South Rose Hill, especially short plats that increase population density, this property is a valuable green space. Moreover, the property is less than ideal for the building of houses, as the east and south areas of the property is designated wetlands (and peat bog, as relayed to me by a neighbor). It was used as a disposal area for wood chips from the previous owner's tree clearing business prior to selling to Mr. MacPherson.
4. There is a sizable permanent exclusive easement along the east side of the property which Mr. MacPherson granted to Michael and Sandy Smith, which reduces the size of the lot and space available for building and development.
5. Part of the property is designated wetland and would require a setback variance if a home were built on the property.
6. There is one structure on the property that could be used for storage. Or, with the doors and windows removed, could be used as a rain or picnic shelter.
7. The neighborhood will volunteer to assist in upkeep of the park, (i.e. mowing, trimming).
8. The Executor of the MacPherson family estate is presently trying to sell the property to a builder.



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

Subject: Juanita High School Pool Status

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Park Board receives an update from staff on the status of the swimming pool at Juanita High School.

BACKGROUND DISCUSSION:

The Lake Washington School District Board of Directors has determined that the school funding ballot measures scheduled to be presented to District voters in February of 2014 will not include funding to replace/renovate the pool at Juanita High School. This would leave the community without a public indoor pool, possibly as early as 2017.

Members of the School Board, as well as concerned citizens, attended a recent City Council meeting and asked that the City address this issue. The City Council is scheduled to discuss the topic further at their meeting on September 17th.

Staff will be prepared to update the Board on latest developments and answer questions at the September meeting.
