Once the priorities were identified, the group added points under each priority to explain how it could be accomplished:

1. Moving People

providing transportation choices and educating people about them.

Concurrency how is it measured and what is the standard

Project funding priorities e.g. CIP are they aligned with goals?

Foundation of interactions with other agencies i.e. investments in Kirkland maximize moving people

Implement and monitor Active Trans. Plan Monitoring mode split and transit performance Technology as a tool to make progress Communications of best practices to employees Just as we are known for pedestrian safety, how can we become known for other things?

2. Sustainability Environmental, Fiscal, Performance, Preservation
