

Project List Development





20-yr Project List Development



Projects are identified through the following methods:

- Previously planning efforts or studies
- In the 6-year Transportation Improvement Program
- Through safety analysis or identified for other engineering purposes
- Suggested projects from the public (with an engineering review)
- Projects that help to support future growth and capacity

20-yr Project List Development



Planning Efforts being integrated include:

- Kirkland Transit Implementation Plan (KTIP)
- Active Transportation Plan (ATP)
- Vision Zero Action Plan
- Local Road Safety Plan
- Safer Routes to School Action Plans
- NE 85th St Station Area Plan

Project List Development



Project groupings:

- Group programmatic improvements (i.e., sidewalk program, signal updates)
- Itemized project list (with a clear location and description)
 - Group projects by category (bike, pedestrian, transit, roadway)
 - Identify those exempt from prioritization (already funded, required for concurrency, developer driven), etc.
 - ~450 projects currently identified



New Connections



From Citywide Transportation Connects and the 128th Corridor Study

- 7 new roadway connections
- 94 new pedestrian/ bike connections

Active Transportation



- 77 intersection/ crossing improvements (mostly pedestrian)
- 3 pedestrian only linear projects in addition to the ~1600 sidewalk gaps identified
- 99 bicycle facility projects (62-78 will likely require right-of-way)
- 61 neighborhood greenway segments
- 100 trail/ multi-use pathways (91 of them require right-of-way)

Active Transportation



Highlights:

- Lake Washington Blvd Promenade
- Lakeshore Plaza bike connection
- NE 85th St Bike/Ped Connection 6th to I-405 plus connections to station area
- Greenways network
- School Zone safety cameras



Project Prioritization

Project Prioritization



Purpose

- Identifies projects that best implement the goals
- Prioritizes which projects should come first
- Helps the city make the best use of limited resources
- Assists decisionmakers in budgeting, planning, and making grant applications

Project Prioritization



Considerations

- Use readily available data
- Measures should be easy to replicate
- Measures should directly reflect the goals of the plan
- Measures should be transparent and easy to understand

Prioritized Project List



- Universe of projects prioritized linking projects to goals
- 20-year projects and programs with high-level cost estimates (range)
- Resulting project list will identify the highest priority, 20-year fiscally constrained project list based on projected funding revenues
- Remaining projects will be identified as unfunded but could still be brought forward in future years if conditions change

Prioritization Highlights



- Council comments received at their Nov 21, 2023 Study Session
- Major updates:
 - Commercial and neighborhood centers will be treated the same
 - Safety will get the highest score
 - Future transit service will be considered in metrics.
 - Safety countermeasure will be given added points (instead of lowest score)

- Council study session on March 19, 2024

- Draft Plan by end of June
- Comp Plan adoption December 2024
