ORDINANCE O-4728

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL THE OF CITY OF KIRKLAND, WASHINGTON, PROVIDING FOR THE FORM OF THE BALLOT PROPOSITION AND SPECIFYING CERTAIN OTHER DETAILS CONCERNING SUBMISSION TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY AT A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD THEREIN ON NOVEMBER 3, 2020, OF A PROPOSITION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF ITS GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS IN THE AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF NOT TO EXCEED \$56,000,000, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE ISSUED UNDER THE LAWS GOVERNING THE INDEBTEDNESS OF CITIES FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING FUNDS TO FINANCE THE CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW FIRE STATION, MODERNIZATION AND RENOVATIONS EXISTING то FIRE STATIONS, AND OTHER PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS, AND LEVY EXCESS PROPERTY TAXES TO PAY THE BONDS.

WHEREAS, in 2011, the City Council (the "Council") of the City
 of Kirkland (the "City") engaged the services of Emergency Services
 Consulting International ("ESCI") to conduct an organizational review of
 the City Fire Department; and

6 WHEREAS, since 2012, Fire Department staff has worked with
7 other City departments and the City Manager's Office to implement
8 certain ESCI recommendations, including through the budget process;
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WHEREAS, the Council completed a Fire Strategic Plan in 2012
 to identify needed investments in staffing, equipment and technology to
 provide for better response times for fire and Emergency Medical
 Services ("EMS"); and

WHEREAS, on February 21, 2017, the Council approved
Resolution R-5239 adopting the City's 2017-2018 Work Program to
"explore potential ballot measures for fire station modernization and
public safety operations to further the goals of Public Safety,
Dependable Infrastructure, and Financial Stability"; and

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WHEREAS, on December 12, 2017, the Council adopted 22 Resolution R-5290, revising the 2017-2018 City Work Program to defer 23 exploration of a fire facilities and operations ballot measure to at least 24 2020 due to public concerns about the cumulative financial impact of 25 property tax increases due to state and regional legislation; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, the Council subsequently implemented a two-phased 29 approach to addressing public safety needs; and 30 31 WHEREAS, phase one included a sales and use tax for enhanced police and public safety services, which was approved by the voters at 32

police and public safety services, which was approved by the voters at
 an election held in November 2018, and phase two includes a bond
 and/or levy lid lift for fire station seismic renovation, capacity expansion,
 and additional firefighter/EMT staffing; and

WHEREAS, on February 19, 2019, the Council adopted the 2019-2020 City Work Program which ranked "exploring a potential ballot measure in 2020 to fund Fire Station modernization and enhanced operations to further the goal of Public Safety" as its number one priority; and

WHEREAS, the City has and expects to continue to experience
unprecedented growth and development, with new types of commercial
and residential structures that need fire/EMS services; and

WHEREAS, providing fire/EMS services that match this economic growth and redevelopment are challenged by the expiration of the annexation sales tax credit in 2021, resulting in the loss of nearly \$4 million annually from the City's general fund; and

52 WHEREAS, to sustainably fund these potential fire/EMS 53 investments, the City must either identify new revenues or significantly 54 reprioritize existing general fund programs such as parks maintenance 55 and street maintenance that also rank as high priorities with City 56 residents; and 57

WHEREAS, in 2019, the Council convened the Community Safety
Advisory Group ("ComSAG") to review options to improve response
times, keep Fire/EMS stations seismically sound, and improve firefighter
health and safety; and

WHEREAS, in February 2020, ComSAG recommended building a new fire station 27 in Totem Lake, renovating fire station 21 in Forbes Creek, station 22 in Houghton, station 26 in North Rose Hill, and constructing a new training building at the site of new station 24 in North Juanita; and

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WHEREAS, since the ComSAG completed their recommendation
in February 2020, the City proclaimed an emergency to combat the
COVID-19 pandemic and has been grappling with the escalating social
and economic impact of the virus and related public health and safety
orders on the community; and

WHEREAS, the capital and operating elements in the proposed ComSAG recommendation would have significantly improved the City's response to COVID-19, and the budget challenges created by the economic impacts of the outbreak curtails the City's ability to fund any of these additional public safety investments without a voter approved revenue source; and

WHEREAS, at their May 19, 2020 Council meeting, the Council directed staff to reprioritize the capital and operating elements funded within the ballot measure(s) to be no more than the ComSAG's recommendation of \$0.225 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation; and

WHEREAS, in order to provide the level of service identified by
the ComSAG, and refined by Council, the training building at new station
24 was removed from the elements to be funded by the proposed capital
bond; and

WHEREAS, to finance such capital costs, it is deemed necessary and advisable by the Council that the City issue and sell one or more series of unlimited tax general obligation bonds in the principal amount of not to exceed \$56,000,000 (the "Bonds"); and

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WHEREAS, the Constitution and laws of the State of Washington
provide that the question of whether such Bonds may be issued and
sold for such purposes and taxes levied to pay such Bonds must be
submitted to the qualified electors of the City for their ratification or
rejection;

103 NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Kirkland does104 ordain as follows:

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106 Section 1. Findings. The Council hereby finds that the best
107 interests of the residents of the City require the City to construct,
108 develop, equip, upgrade, acquire, and improve its public health and
109 safety facilities, including but not limited to the following projects
110 (together, the "Projects"):

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- Construct and equip a new fire station and related facilities; and
- Renovate, improve, and equip existing fire stations and related facilities, including but not limited to Fire Stations 22, 21, and 26.

The Projects shall include the acquisition of real property as necessary
to locate such facilities. The City shall complete the Projects at the time,
in the order and in the manner deemed most necessary and advisable
by the Council. Costs of the Projects, which are estimated to be more
than \$56,000,000, will be paid from proceeds of the Bonds authorized
herein and other available funds of the City.

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The cost of all necessary appraisals, negotiation, property 125 126 acquisition, closing, architectural, engineering, project management, financial, legal and other consulting services, inspection and testing, 127 128 demolition, relocation, administrative and relocation expenses, permitting, mitigation, construction, and other costs incurred in 129 connection with the foregoing capital improvements shall be deemed a 130 part of the capital costs of such Projects. Such Projects shall be 131 complete with all necessary real property, equipment and 132 appurtenances. 133

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135 The Council shall determine the exact specifications for the Projects, and the components thereof, as well as the timing, order and 136 137 manner of completing the components of the Projects. The Council may alter, make substitutions to, and amend such components as it 138 139 determines are in the best interests of the City and consistent with the general descriptions provided herein. The Council shall determine the 140 application of moneys available for the various Projects so as to 141 142 accomplish, as nearly as may be, all of the Projects.

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If the Council shall determine that it has become impractical to 144 design, construct, improve, obtain permits, renovate, acquire, develop, 145 or equip all or any component of the Projects by reason of changed 146 conditions, incompatible development, costs substantially in excess of 147 the amount of Bond proceeds or tax levies estimated to be available, or 148 acquisition by or dependence on a superior governmental authority, the 149 City shall not be required to provide such component or components. 150 If all of the Projects have been constructed or acquired or duly provided 151 152 for, or found to be impractical, the City may apply remaining proceeds of the Bonds authorized herein (including earnings thereon) or any 153 portion thereof to other public safety capital purposes or to the 154 redemption of the Bonds as the Council, in its discretion, shall 155 determine. 156

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In the event that the proceeds from the sale of the Bonds, plus any other money of the City legally available for such purpose, are insufficient to accomplish all of the Projects, the City shall use the available funds for paying the cost of those portions of the Projects deemed by the Council most necessary and in the best interest of the City.

Section 2. Authorization of Bonds. For the purpose of providing 165 166 all or a portion of the funds necessary to finance the costs of the Projects, together with incidental costs and costs of issuance of the 167 Bonds, the City shall issue and sell its unlimited tax general obligation 168 bonds in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$56,000,000 169 (the "Bonds"). The Bonds shall be issued in an amount not exceeding 170 the amount approved by the electors of the City and not exceeding the 171 amount permitted by the Constitution and laws of the State of 172 Washington. The balance, if any, of the cost of the Projects shall be 173 174 paid out of any other legally available funds. The Bond proceeds (and earnings thereon) shall be used to finance the costs of the Projects, 175 176 together with incidental costs and costs related to the sale and issuance of the Bonds, and shall not be used for the replacement of equipment 177 or for a purpose other than a capital purpose. 178

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Section 3. Details of the Bonds. The Bonds provided for in 180 Section 2 hereof shall be issued in such amounts and at such time or 181 times as deemed necessary and advisable by the Council and as 182 permitted by law. The Bonds may be issued in one or more series and 183 shall bear interest payable at a rate or rates authorized by the Council. 184 185 The Bonds shall mature in such amounts and at such times within a maximum term of 30 years from date of issue of a series, all as 186 187 authorized by the Council and as provided by law. The Bonds shall be unlimited tax general obligations of the City and, unless paid from other 188 sources, both principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be payable out 189 of annual tax levies to be made upon all the taxable property within the 190 City without limitation as to rate or amount and in excess of any 191 constitutional or statutory tax limitations. The exact date, form, terms, 192 maturities, covenants and manner of sale of the Bonds shall be as 193 hereafter fixed by ordinance or ordinances of the Council. 194 195

In anticipation of the issuance of the Bonds, the City may issue
short-term obligations as otherwise authorized by chapter 39.50 RCW.
Such obligations may be paid or refunded with proceeds of the Bonds.
The proceeds of the Bonds may also be used to reimburse the City for
expenditures previously made for such Projects.

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Section 4. Bond Election. It is hereby found that the best 202 interests of the inhabitants of the City require the submission to the 203 qualified electors of the City of a proposition authorizing the City to issue 204 Bonds for the purposes of funding the Projects, at an election to be held 205 on November 3, 2020. The King County Director of Records and 206 207 Elections (the "Director"), as ex officio supervisor of elections in King County, Washington, is hereby requested to assume jurisdiction of and 208 209 to call and conduct the election to be held within the City and to submit to the qualified electors of the City the proposition hereinafter set forth. 210 211 Such election shall be conducted by mail.

The City Attorney and City Clerk are each authorized individually to approve changes to the ballot title, if any, deemed necessary by the Director.
245 246 247 248 249 250	The City Clerk is authorized to make necessary clerical corrections to this ordinance including, but not limited to, the correction of scrivener's or clerical errors, references, numbering, section/subsection numbers, and any reference thereto.
250 251 252 253 254 255	The proper City officials are authorized to perform such duties as are necessary or required by law to submit the question of whether the Bonds shall be issued, as provided in this ordinance, to the electors at the November 3, 2020 election.
256 257 258	<u>Section 5</u> . <u>Voters' Pamphlet</u> . The preparation and distribution of a local voters' pamphlet providing information on the foregoing ballot measure is hereby authorized. The pamphlet shall include arguments
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259 260 261 262 263 264 265 266 267 268 269 270 271 272 273 274 275 276 277 278 279 280 281 282 283	advocating approval and disapproval of the ballot measure. In accordance with RCW 29A.32.280, the arguments advocating approval and rejection of the ballot measure shall be prepared by committees appointed by the City Council by resolution not later than forty-five days before the publication of the pamphlet. Each committee shall be composed of not more than three persons; however, a committee may seek the advice of any person or persons. The committee advocating approval shall be composed of persons known to favor the ballot measure, and the committee advocating rejection shall be composed of persons known to oppose the ballot measure. Section 6. Ratification. Any act consistent with the authority and prior to the effective date of this ordinance is hereby ratified and confirmed. Section 7. Effective Date. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days from and after its passage by the Kirkland City Council and publication of a summary of this ordinance in accordance with Kirkland Municipal Code 1.08.017.
