	The current highest use of this proposed crosswalk is folks using the bus stops on both the east and west sides of 132^{nd} Ave NE. This is used for both northbound and southbound travellers. The closest crosswalk is up the street at 132^{nd} Ave and NE 132^{nd} street, which is a little far north after getting off the bus at this location. In addition, park users need a safe place to cross 132^{nd} Ave.					
	With future developemnet of this park already underway we anticipate many more park users .Many will be encumbered with dogs, bikes and athletic equipment in tow. This is a very busy roadway carrying upwards of 16,000 cars a day at speeds of 35mpg and often higher. It should be noted that this roadway is also a School walk route. Safer ways to cross this increasingly busy street should be available for both kids and adults.

I am writing in support of the Evergreen Hill Neighborhood Association (EHNA) proposal to the city for the crosswalk across 132nd at NE 129th Street.

I have been a resident of Kingsgate for nearly 7.5 years, and over time, I have seen the amount of vehicular and pedestrian traffic increase. I expect this to continue increasing over time, and even more so once the 132nd square park construction is complete, and the new fields are in use.

When I drive along or walk (sometimes with my dog) along 132nd I frequently motorists speed well beyond 35MPH as well as pedestrians who jay walk. Fortunately, I haven't seen an accident there and I hope to never see one.

Putting a cross walk across 132nd at NE 129th St will improve pedestrian and vehicle safety.

Please consider adding a **crosswalk across 132nd Ave at NE 129th Street**, which is near the eastern exit exit of Forest Grove. Traffic studies show that over 16 thousand vehicle travel 132nd on a daily basis with spends of 35 MPH and often higher. There is a bus stop on either side of 132nd Ave and we feel that an official crosswalk is needed for the safety of bus riders. In addition with the anticipation of park improvements safer street crossing access is needed here.

I'm writing this letter in support of the 2020 neighborhood safety program application to install a crosswalk at NE 129th street and 132nd Ave. NE. As you are no doubt aware, 132nd Ave. NE is a very heavily used thoroughfare and vehicles of all types are constantly passing by this point. It is very difficult and dangerous for anyone to attempt to cross 132nd Ave at this location. There are three different reasons that Kirkland residents frequently attempt to cross at this place:

- 1) Access to $132^{\rm nd}$ Square Park from the east side of $132^{\rm nd}$ Ave. NE
- 2) Access to the bus stop on the west side of 132nd Ave. NE (#244 * #930 heading south)
- 3) Access to the bus stop on the east side of 132nd Ave. NE (#244 & #930 buses heading north).

I believe that it would be a great benefit to the residents of this section of Kirkland to have a crosswalk installed at or near NE 129th street and 132nd Ave. NE. The usual roadway paint and a center island would be required, as this is a three lane roadway. A thermoplastic bump strip may also be needed at the curb-cuts to comply with ADA requirements and crossing flags are recommended for pedestrian use.
