## 2023 CITY OF KIRKLAND POLICE Prop 1 Annual Accountability **Report Card**



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When community members call police they expect a prompt response, public safety to be upheld, and community services to be available when the need them. The City of Kirkland has been able to continue this high level of service thanks to the **Enhanced Police Services and Community Safety Ballot** Measure (Police Prop 1), approved by voters in 2018.

In 2023, Prop 1 has allowed the Kirkland Police Department to: add an additional officer to its dedicated proactive investigations unit, add an additional Neighborhood Resource Officer position, and host three Guns for Gift Cards exchanges, removing more than 200 firearms from our community.

Prop 1 has also allocated more than \$1 million dollars for Human Services programs including homelessness services and behavioral health programs.

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LEVY OVERVIEW A 0.1 percent sales tax increase was estimated to raise approximately \$1.8 million a year. In 2022, the tax raised approximately \$2.6 million.

Neighborhood Resource Officer and Mental Health ProfessionalPolice Prop 1 added a second NRO position in 2020, which is assigned as a co-responder with the Prop 1 Mental Health Professional (MHP).The NRO works with the MHP and other regional MHP's to provide support to individuals experiencing behavioral health issues and resources to those experiencing homelessness. The NRO continues to assist patrol with complex cases that require long-term problem solving of neighborhood disputes or locations that experience recurring criminal activity, as well as department wide projects and initiatives.	<ul> <li>NRO/MHP pair responded to 551 calls for service</li> <li>Added an additional NRO in 2022</li> <li>MHP moved to new Community Responder Program</li> </ul>
Evolution from School Resource Officers (SROs) to Community Resource Officers (CROs) Starting in September 2023, Kirkland schools will have three Community Resource Officers (CROs) to be the first point of contact between police and the school district on law enforcement issues. The CROs will not be stationed in any one school but will be available to respond to a school, whenever needed. CROs will be deployed to other City law enforcement and community needs such as speed zone enforcement and seasonal bike patrol. Student safety continues to be the top priority of the change from SROs to CROs.
