

## INFORMATION BULLETIN WINDOWS AS AN EXIT

- 1. Windows as exits are an essential part of escape planning.
- 2. Windows can be identified as primary exit for rooms on the first floor and secondary for rooms on the second floor and higher.
- 3. Windows/doors should be options taught and selected by individuals developing the plan base plan on type of home and occupant teach the safest way out.
- 4. Windows designated as escape routes should be:
  - a. Easily opened.
  - b. Not painted over.
  - c. Large enough to exit from.
  - d. Should not have keyed locks.
  - e. Should be able to open from the inside with no special knowledge.
  - f. Checked for operation and maintained on a regular basis.
- 5. Windows used for escape purposes from higher elevations (two-story and up) required escape ladders to assist individuals in a safe exit. Escape ladders should have standaway rungs.
- 6. If an escape ladder is not available, a sheet or blanket should be hung out the window to signal rescuers. If, as a last resort, an escape must be attempted, back out of the window, hang from the sill facing the building, and drop to the ground feet first.
- 7. Caution is urged in teaching children to break open windows. If forced to break them, clear all glass shards from sill, place blanket over sill, and escape.
- 8. Plan and practice escape routes utilizing windows. Educate the occupants on the operation of the windows and their safe escape.
