# IRKLAND PARKS & COMMUNITY SERVICES – APRIL 2023



A seasonal job as a lifeguard, groundskeeper, or camp counselor might be the start of a career in Parks and Community Services (PCS). Several current department employees began their careers this way including Parks Operations Manager, Jason Filan. For young people, a seasonal job can be a great way to gain skills and confidence. Or on the flip side, a recreation attendant job can be a great way for retired folks to stay active and involved in the community.

Every year Parks and Community Services hires over 100 seasonal employees, primarily in the summer. To help fill seasonal positions this year, the department hosted a job fair on April 1, 2023, at the North Kirkland Community Center (NKCC).



Community members and prospective job applicants were met with smiling faces



and fun swag at the job fair. NKCC's multipurpose room was set up with booths where folks could learn about the different jobs and positions in the department. The staff's creativity and enthusiasm were on display as each booth was decorated top to bottom in themed décor relating to the different jobs. Booths included Parks Maintenance, Rentals, Events, Day Camps, Sports, Aquatics, and Teen Programs.

The City's Human Resources department also hosted a booth at the job fair to answer any pertinent questions about working for the City and to allow applicants the ability to apply on-site. Interested applicants also participated in on-site job interviews.

# **ADMINISTRATION**

#### PARKS 2023 BALLOT EXPLORATION

City Council and Park Board discussed the potential ballot measure during their joint meeting on April 4, 2023. Park Board recommended that City Council consider the following three elements for the potential ballot measure: enhanced safety and security, synthetic turf multi-purpose sports fields, and permanent off-leash dog parks.



Staff worked with EMC Research to conduct a statistically valid Community Survey from April 20 through April 24, 2023. The City hosted an open-link survey using the same questions as the EMC Research survey from Thursday, April 27 through

Thursday, May 11, 2023. The results of both the statistically valid survey and the open-link survey will be shared with Council at the May 16, 2023 Council study session.

City Council will make a final decision on potential parks and recreation ballot measure(s) this summer. Learn more about the process at **KIRKLANDWA.GOV/PARKS2023BALLOT**.

#### **FACILITY FEASIBILITY STUDY**

Opsis Architecture created three additional facility options as requested by the City:

- One 80,000 square foot facility at North Kirkland Community Center with two pools and a two-court gym.
- An option with two complementary facilities with aquatics and recreation elements balanced between locations. The Houghton Park and Ride 67,000 square foot facility would be aquatics focused and the North Kirkland Community Center 45,000 square foot facility would be recreation focused.
- One slightly larger sized replacement for North Kirkland Community Center (approximately 18,000 square feet) that could be combined with one of the existing Houghton Park and Ride facility options.

# PARK PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

#### **132ND SQUARE PARK**

Construction is in the final stages with an anticipated substantial completion date of June 5. City Council and Park Board toured the site on April 1 to see the progress to date. A larger grand-reopening community celebration is being planned for June or July. *Background*: The City is replacing a non-regulation grass sports field with a synthetic turf field after the installation of a surface water detention structure underneath the field. Construction started on June 28, 2021.



# MARINA PARK SHORELINE RENOVATIONS

Designers provided preliminary concepts and options for repairs or replacement of

dock and shoreline structures. Concepts and cost estimates are in preliminary review. *Background*: In late 2022, a portion of the sidewalk and stairs at Marina Park experienced significant subsidence. Shoreline structures at Marina Park were previously evaluated in the 2019 Kirkland Shoreline Structures Assessment Report.

## OO DENNY PARK PICNIC SHELTER

Staff continues to develop cost-effective options for the installation of a second picnic shelter at the park. This project will use existing funds remaining from the Finn Hill Park District.

# **HUMAN SERVICES**

#### KIRKLAND YOUTH COUNCIL MINI GRANT PROGRAM - SPRING 2023

The Kirkland Youth Council (KYC) is allocated \$8,500 annually for their mini grant program to provide funding to Kirkland youth and community groups. Mini grant requests are reviewed three times every year in October, January, and April. The Kirkland Youth Council received nine applications totaling almost \$8,000 in requests for their Spring 2023 review cycle. The following five programs were awarded a total of \$2,860.00 in grant funding:



- Kirkland Parks & Community Foundation: Mural & Community Paint Day Kirkland Parks & Community Foundation and Rotary Club of Kirkland Downtown are collaborating with a Juanita High student to host a mural Community Paint Day for Kirkland youth to paint a 144-foot-long by 12-foot-tall "Welcome to Kirkland" themed mural painted in downtown Kirkland, on Lake Street S near the cross-intersection of 2nd Ave. Grant funds will cover mural supplies. Amount awarded: \$800.
- Lake Washington High School: Multilingual Learner Program The multilingual learner program at LWHS is organizing an end of year family event to celebrate, honor, and recognize the hard work and talents of students. Grant funds will cover the costs of certificates to honor the graduating seniors and refreshments for the event. Amount awarded: \$500.
- Lake Washington Junior Kang Football: Guardian Caps XT LW Junior Kang football is working to provide Guardian Caps XT for players to augment existing helmets to address the impact severity of blows for contact positions. The goal of wearing Guardian Caps XT is to reduce the risk of severe brain and spinal cord injuries. Grant funds will cover the purchase of 13 Guardian Caps XT for the program. Amount awarded: \$760.
- Rose Hill Middle School: Hip Hop 2 Prevent Hip Hop 2 Prevent is a program that aims to encourage student expression through music and poetry. RHMS would like to introduce the program to its multi-language learning population. Grant funds will cover the program facilitator fees. Amount awarded: \$700.
- Rose Hill/Stella Schola Middle School: Foreign Language Book Collection The Rose Hill Middle School library works to ensures their collection remains current with a diverse variety of popular novels, series, and foreign language books for multi-language learners. Grant funds will support the purchase of books based on student requests and the purchase of books in languages reflective of the student population at RHMS and Stella Schola MS. Amount awarded: \$100.

## **HUMAN SERVICES GRANT FUNDING UPDATE**

In December 2022, the Kirkland City Council approved the 2023-2024 City budget including \$ 2,624,351 per year in funding to support local non-profits who provide services to community members. Starting January 1, Human Services staff worked with agencies to complete the two-year contracting process and have completed 29 Kirkland-specific human services funding contracts. Additionally, staff are working in partnership with other Eastside cities to complete more than 40 jointly contracted programs. ## **HUMAN SERVICES COMMUNITY PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: 4 TOMORROW**

4 Tomorrow is a Bellevue-based organization serving Youth and Latinx communities on the Eastside. 4 Tomorrow received funding for the 2023-24 grant cycle to support three programs. It was the first time the agency applied for funding through Kirkland's human services grant funding program. 4 Tomorrow previously partnered with the City during the COVID-19 pandemic to administer rent assistance to households experiencing instability and to support digital equity work. Below is a summary of the three programs funded for Kirkland's 2023-2024 human services grant funding:

- Life Services Program: This is a comprehensive case management program which provides culturally sensitive support to the Latinx communities in East King County. This unique one-stop-shop utilizes individualized coaching techniques to coordinate services and aid in navigating resources & systems. This program supports individuals in achieving short- and long-term goals related but not limited to: Housing Stability, Health and Mental Health Care, Immigration, Education, and Crisis Prevention and Response.
- Mental Health and Gap Therapy Program: The innovative program designed by the Latinx community provides coordination, gap therapy services, education, and community connection.
- Rental, Mortgage, and Move-in Assistance: This program seeks to provide emergency rental, move-in, and mortgage assistance to low to moderate income households (60% AMI or below) in East King County who are experiencing financial or housing instability. This program seeks to address housing instability by pairing financial assistance with the Life Services Program's coaching model to build self-sufficiency.


# PARK MANAGEMENT

## **APRIL SHOWERS AND APRIL FLOWERS**

The April rains are great for our native trees, shrubs, and groundcovers. With the sun finally out, our parks are green and healthy, and our community is out and about ready to take it all in! #### **BALLFIELDS/CEMETERY**

- Rebuilt the pitching mound at Peter Kirk Park's Lee Johnson field.
- Initiated the mow program at all park and school sites and aerated the turf at Juanita Beach and Juanita Elementary.
- Prepped for games at all park field sites.
- Cleaned graffiti in the Peter Kirk restrooms.
- Implemented burial and internment services at the cemetery.
- Resurfaced the infields with Turface at park sites as needed.
- Turned over both fields at Kirkland Middle School.



#### **HORTICULTURE**

- Treated broadleaf weeds with Finale at Forbes Creek and Spinney Homestead.
- Weeded the flower beds at Van Aalst, Marina, Houghton, David
  E. Brink, and Marsh.
- Inspected, cleaned, and started irrigation systems at all sites.
- Dragged and overseeded the turf at Marina.
- Pruned trees at Brookhaven, Peter Kirk, and Forbes Creek.
- Fertilized the turf at Marsh and Marina.
- Added wood chips to the trees at OO Denny.

# NATURAL AREAS/GREEN KIRKLAND PARTNERSHIP

- Bucked up and spread woody debris at OO Denny.
- Met with new Parks Maintenance volunteers at Carillon Woods to plan spring projects.
- Removed historically dumped construction materials from Open Space JU1.
- Pruned vegetation back from the causeway at Juanita Bay.
- Provided materials and supplies for all Earth Month GKP volunteer events.
- Installed plant protection signage at Juanita Beach, Open Space JU1, and Open Space HL1.
- Removed trees and debris leaning on fence along I-405 at Watershed.

#### TASTE OF RETIREMENT




#### **AARP TAX HELP**




