The Park Beautification Program will provide opportunities for individuals, families, and groups to volunteer in their favorite parks throughout the year weeding flower beds, planting perennial flowers, cleaning educational signage, raking beaches, picking up litter, and finding ways to team up with Parks Management staff to make Kirkland's parks even more beautiful, welcoming, inclusive and fun.



Volunteer opportunities will be generated by staff identifying needed areas of help in caring for Kirkland's parks, as well as by groups of volunteers who have a particular place they'd like to serve. Scheduled volunteer events will be listed on the CITY OF

Groups of five or more that don't find a pre-scheduled event that works for them are encouraged to contact Parks Coordinator Kevin Ball at kirklandwa.gov to create a unique volunteer opportunity that works for their team and Parks staff. If your group has so much fun that they would like to come back regularly, enroll your team in Kirkland's Adopt-a-Park program.

ADMINISTRATION



NEW PARK ADDED

In September 2023, Kirkland City Council approved the purchase of property at 212 6th Street South from the Estate of James G. Fisk, adjacent to the Cross Kirkland Corridor Interim Trail. The new park will be named the Fisk Family Park. Parks and Community Services completed a thorough evaluation of the site and began maintenance of the new park in December 2023 with plans for moderate improvements in 2024.

HUMAN SERVICES

ESSENTIALS FIRST HOLIDAY FAIR

Human Services staff participated in a Holiday Fair on Friday, December 8 hosted by Essentials First in Bellevue. Staff shared information on City of Kirkland services while handing out ingredients for a hot drink on a cold, sunny day. More than 20 local organizations participated in the event providing information and connecting with the over 250 participants in attendance. Folks were in line well before the opening. KIRKLAND YOUTH COUNCIL WRAPS UP THE YEAR

The Kirkland Youth Council (KYC) had a busy December with members participating in two holiday staples in the City of Kirkland. The KYC-hosted Holly-Day Brunch returned on Saturday, December 9 after a three-year pause due to the pandemic. KYC members served a meal they prepared, provided entertainment for, and connected with older community members over age 55 at the Peter Kirk Community Center. KYC youth were back to work the next morning, volunteering at the 12Ks of Kirkland Run on Sunday, December 10 by staffing the hydration station.



PARK PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

Below is a high-level summary and status update of the active Park Planning and Development projects. Please visit the Park Planning and Development **WEBSITE** to learn more about these projects.

132ND SQUARE PARK

With the slide and new turf installed, the project is now complete. Staff are working on close-out procedures. Background of the Project: The City replaced a nonregulation grass sports field with a synthetic turf field after the installation of a surface water detention structure underneath the field. Construction started in June 2021 and the park was opened in July 2023.

EVEREST PARK PLAY AREA AND ADA ENHANCEMENTS

Everest Park playground has been identified as the next playground to be replaced for the benefit of the community. Staff plans to release a Request for Proposal for professional services in Spring 2024 to design the playground and connect accessible pathways. Background of the Project: This ongoing capital project strives to replace aging playgrounds, improve sports courts, and make ADA improvements in the parks throughout the system.



HOUGHTON AND EVEREST RESTROOM REPLACEMENT

The restroom building at Houghton Park is planned for replacement. During the scoping process, staff identified opportunities to analyze the building's current location and potential for programmatic improvements. Staff has contracted with a consultant to develop preliminary 10% design options and costing for further consideration. A kick-off meeting is planned for January. The restroom building at Everest Park is also planned for replacement in 2024 due to its age and condition. Staff has contracted with a consultant to develop design and construction drawings. *Background of the Project*: This capital project repairs or replaces park restrooms in the system. Restrooms at Houghton and Everest Restrooms have been identified for replacement due to their age and condition.

MARINA PARK SHORELINE RENOVATIONS

The project has been refined to focus on repairs to the south fingers and pier along with a few upland repairs and improvements. Staff is now working with the consultant to develop the next contract for the next phase of design work. *Background of the Project*: Shoreline structures at Marina Park were evaluated and identified for repairs in the 2019 Kirkland Shoreline Structures Assessment Report. In late 2022, a portion of the sidewalk and stairs at Marina Park experienced significant subsidence.

PARK MANAGEMENT

DECEMBER IN THE PARKS

This December has been relatively warm and wet, bringing late leaf fall and VERY early weed growth so we've spent a lot of time trying to keep up with the plants. Staff began maintenance of the new Fisk Family Park this month and removed a large dying maple tree for the safety of the community. See the **Parks Management Detail Reports** for a breakdown of tasks and locations. Here are monthly highlights from our four crews:

BALLFIELDS/CEMETERY

- Cleared blackberry bushes around the basketball court at Terrace Park
- Weeded the parking lot beds and tree rings at Everest and Crestwoods parks
- Implemented several burial services at the cemetery
- Prepped Marina Park and Juanita Beach for bonfires

HORTICULTURE

- Inspected fire damage to trees at Kiwanis Park
- Searched for property line markers on the east end of Juanita Bay Park
- Weeded the flower beds by the archway and sign at Heritage Park
- Removed blackberry along the beach and from the northeast corner of Marsh Park
- Removed large hanging branch from sweet gum tree on the south side of Houghton Neighborhood Park
- Planted six trees at Everest and five trees at Forbes Creek parks



NATURAL AREAS/GREEN KIRKLAND PARTNERSHIP

- Spread wood chips at Edith Moulton Park
- Removed overgrown Rosa rugosa from parking lot beds at Juanita Beach and seeded with native wildflowers
- Repaired fence at Juanita Beach dog park
- Cleared multiple downed trees from Watershed Park
- Planted 100 native shrubs and groundcovers and treated invasive trees along the creek at Everest Park
- Pruned the boardwalk along the causeway and trails at Juanita Bay Park

SUPPORT

- Added drainage hole to underside of race car bouncer at Houghton Neighborhood Park
- Inspected playgrounds at Juanita Beach, OO Denny, Waverly
 Beach, Rose Hill Meadows, Houghton Beach, Carillon Woods, McAuliffe, Peter Kirk, Heritage, Terrace, and Totem
 Lake parks
- Repaired the restroom door lock and tandem swing at Juanita Beach Park
- Removed benches at Peter Kirk Pool and stored them in locker rooms for the winter
- Repaired table at Marina Park
- Removed old partitions at Peter Kirk Pool and prepped new partitions for installation

camps run by Mad Science, Snapology, and Northwest University







TEENS CREATING CORE MEMORIES


