

How many trees can I remove?

Allowable tree removals depends on your property size and whether there are special conditions such as critical areas, Landmark Trees, or recent development.

For lots without special conditions, homeowners can submit a <u>free</u> Tree Removal Allowance to remove trees per the table on the right.

Landmark Trees require a permit for removal

3 replacement trees must be planted from an approved list of species

Lot Size (square feet)	Allowed removals per 12 months*
Up to 10,000	2 trees
10,001 to 20,000	3 trees
20,001 or greater	4 trees

*Properties must also retain a minimum of 2, 3 or 4 trees based on lot size to qualify for tree removal allowances

2 Are there restrictions on the removal of large trees?

Trees 26 inches diameter or larger (Landmark Trees) have special protection requirements.

Property owners may remove up to 1 Landmark Tree per 12 months as long as there are no special restrictions for their lot.

Otherwise, you must have the tree assessed by a Qualified Arborist and the Landmark Tree must meet the City's hazard or nuisance criteria.

For any Landmark Tree removal, you must submit a Private Tree Removal Permit (fees apply).

Adjacent homeowner must submit a permit to the City and hire a contractor to perform the removal if approved

Emergency Tree Removals

If you believe a tree located on public property presents imminent risk (i.e., is actively failing or severely damaged), you should contact the City ASAP at 425-587-3600

Why does the City prohibit tree topping?

- X Stresses trees by removing most of the foliage and starving the tree
- Y Creates large wounds more susceptible to insect and disease infestation
- X Can lead to sunburn of tree tissue and branch death



- Results in tree decay which increases likelihood of failure
- Can result in unacceptable risk due to new shoots growing from decayed/weak areas



Topping is the indiscriminate cutting of tree branches to stubs or lateral branches that are not big enough to assume the terminal role

Can I remove a tree along the street right-of-way?

Trees located along streets and on public property provide an amenity to all. Because of this, the City requires that all tree removals on public property go through the permitting process.


To be approved for removal, the tree must present a hazard that cannot be maintenance such as pruning.

For any public tree removal, you must submit a Public Tree Removal Permit (fees apply).

Adjacent homeowner must submit a permit to the City and the City will schedule the work in order of priority based on tree condition
