

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



### **OPERATIONS**

The Operations Division is the largest and most public-facing section in the department. This Division is home to the Patrol and Traffic Units, as well as to our K-9 team and SWAT. The men and women who serve as first responders within the Operations Division are highly trained professionals who work hard to keep the City of Kirkland safe. This is accomplished by engaging in time-proven traditional law enforcement activities, complemented by the latest innovative strategies in community policing and problem-based policing models.

The Operations Division is led by a Captain, who is supported by two Operations Lieutenants. Each lieutenant oversees three Patrol squads, and one supervises the K-9 team while the other manages the Trafic Unit. Operations Captain St Jean is also responsible for the Special Operations Unit, which consists of the Special Response Team and the Hostage Negotiation Team.

With retrements and promot ons, newly promoted Captain St

Jean took over for Operat ons Captain Hamilton in the fall of 2016, while newly promoted Lieutenants

Aksdal and Saloum took the places of Operat ons Lieutenants Murray and Haslip during spring.

During 2016, the Operations Division addressed the challenge of stafing shortages. In order to stabilize and augment the Patrol Unit through this time, Chief Harris temporarily reallocated the Trafic Unit, Neighborhood Resource Officer, and K-9 team to Patrol squads. During this time period, Patrol is absorbing some extra responsibility, but they have stepped up to the plate honorably.

Looking forward to 2017, we anticipate having a busy year with respect to the feld training of new Patrol of cers!

### Patrol


Patrol is the core function of any police department. These are the men and women in uniform who

go out into the community every day to protect and serve the public. They are responsible for daily enforcement of laws, responding to emergency and nonemergency calls, contacting people throughout the City of Kirkland, and promoting our department's community policing goals.

A patrol officer comes to work every day (or night) without knowing exactly what the day will hold. On any given shift, Patrol may respond to a broad assortment of call types, including traffic collisions, burglary reports, death investigations, disturbances, domestic violence incidents, DUIs, suspicious circumstances, mental health crises, alarms, weapons complaints, and suicidal subjects. Every single shift can be wildly different, which keeps our officers on their toes!

Fun Fact? Our two most experienced patrol officers have each served as a police officer for a total of 34 years. One started his career at Honolulu PD and the other at Los Angeles Sheriff's Office. They both came to Kirkland PD as lateral officers in the



### Traf c Division


2016 Collisions



The main goal of the Traf c Division is to improve overall community safety. To accomplish this, the unit enforces traf c laws throughout the city but also concentrates at ent on on citzen-reported complaint zones. Traf c of cers respond to invest-gate collisions and part cipate in campaigns such as "Target Zero" (combat ng DUIs) and "Click It or Ticket" (focusing on seatbelt violat ons).

Of cers assigned to the Traf c Division may patrol by car, SUV, or motorcycle.

In fall 2016, our Traf c Unit was temporarily reassigned to Patrol to assist with staf ng. During this reassignment period, Patrol will be handling Traf c's responsibilit es.





Our non-commissioned Parking Enforcement Of cers (PEOs) enforce the city's various parking regulations, with an emphasis on city parks and business districts.

In 2016, new PEO Zachary Knight joined our long-t me PEO Ginger Collins. The two work hard to maintain reasonable parking turnover and enforce relevant Kirkland Municipal Codes.

#### **OPERATIONS > UTVs / DREs**

We added two Utility Terrain Vehicles (UTVs) to our feet back in 2015. E.P.I.C. 1 and E.P.I.C. 2 are primarily used to patrol the popular Cross Kirkland Corridor.

Their names, acronyms for Environmental Police Investigation Car, were suggested by Henry David Thoreau Elementary School 5<sup>th</sup> grade students and won a city-wide naming contest.

The E.P.I.C.s are 100% electric, 4-wheel drive, legal for street driving, and can reach speeds up to 35mph. As of cial police vehicles,

they're even equipped with lights and sirens!

During 2016, KPD had three active Drug Recognit on Experts (DREs): Lieutenant L. Brouelet e, who is also a DRE Instructor; Corporal P. Baxter;

and Detect ve C. Slominski. DREs help other of cers enforce Washington's DUI laws by providing expertse in evaluating drivers who may be impaired by drugs. DREs conduct specialized evaluations, which can assist of cers in obtaining blood search warrants and impaired driving convictions. In addition to aiding KPD of cers with their investigations, Kirkland's DREs also provided assistance to Mercer Island PD during the year.

During Kirkland PD's spring in-service training, Lieutenant Brouelet e and Corporal Baxter taught Stand-



ardized Field Sobriety Test (SFST) refreshers to of cers. Lieutenant Brouelete also taught SFSTs to a class of Park Rangers at Skagit Valley College in Mount Vernon.

Additionally, Kirkland's DREs provided education to the public through such forums as the annual Cit zens' Academy and the biennial mock DUI scenario, which was held at Lake Washington High School in 2016.

#### **OPERATIONS > K-9 / PIO Cadre**


The K-9 Unit consists of one patrol team: an of cer and a canine. Of cer D. Hopkins and his partner, Thor, are responsible for assisting patrol of cers

with locating and retrieving feeing suspects, clearing buildings, searching for lost or missing persons, and crowd control. Our K-9 team is trained in tracking

and is certified by the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission. They will respond not only throughout Kirkland, but also to Redmond, Bellevue, and Bothell on mutual aid assists.

In 2016, Thor and Of cer Hopkins achieved their 85<sup>th</sup> total capture as a team. They also had a capture while assist ng Tukwila PD in September, further cement ng Thor's quality reputat on in the K-9 world.

KPD is immensely grateful for multiple donations from a generous private citizen. Her gif, earmarked for K-9 equipment, was used

The main goals of the new cadre include: increasing outreach and transparency within the community, reaching a broad audience (through tradit onal and social media), and taking a proact ve stance on conveying informat on to our community.

#### **OPERATIONS > North Sound Metro**

Since 2013, Kirkland has been a part of the North Sound Metro SWAT team, an interagency team represent ng Kirkland, Bothell, Edmonds, Lake Forest Park, Lynnwood, Mill Creek, Monroe, Mountlake Terrace, Mukilteo, and Redmond. The Kirkland PD Special Operations Unit contributes the members of its two specialized teams: the Special Response Team (SRT) and the Hostage Negot at on Team (HNT).

North Sound Metro SWAT deploys to handle critical field operations where intense negotiations and/or special tact cal deployment methods beyond the capacity of patrol of cers appear to be necessary.

SRT

In 2016, Kirkland PD provided five of the 36 tactical operators

on North Sound Metro SWAT. Additionally, Kirk-

land Captain M. St Jean served as the interagency team's Assistant Commander. Operators commit to a demanding training schedule and must maintain stringent f tness and weapon qualif cat ons.

North Sound Metro conducted 10 high-risk missions last year. Kirkland SRT members additionally helped out on four higher-risk incidents or warrants for KPD without the assistance of North Sound Metro.

### ADMINISTRATION

The primary responsibility of the Administrative Division is to support all of the other police department divisions and units. The Administrative Division consists of the Records Unit, the Evidence/Property Unit, and the Corrections Unit. The Division also performs a number of specialized functions, including implementing and maintaining the current fleet of vehicles, the computer systems, and the police radios. Working together with personnel from other agencies and within the City, the Administrative Division strives to run an efficient and effective Police Department.

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Our Administrative Division is headed by a Captain, who is supported by the Administrative Lieutenant and the Corrections

Lieutenant. The Captain is responsible for overseeing the day-to-day running of the departmental facility and police support systems. The Administrative Lieutenant supports the Captain on the police side of the department, while the Correct ons Lieutenant is charged with management and supervision of the Kirkland Jail.

In November 2016, Captain Hamilton moved from the Operations Division to the Administrative Division. Following Lieutenant Seibert's retrement in February, Lieutenant Murray became the Administrat ve Lieutenant. Lieutenant Balkema cont nues in his posit on as Correct ons Lieutenant.

One of the major responsibilities of the Administratve Division is hiring. This has been a high priority for the Kirkland Police Department: even in the face of nat onwide law enforcement staf ng challenges, we are unwilling to compromise on the caliber of applicant we accept in our city. In 2016, we streamlined our testing and interview processes for new hires and lateral of cers. The Division also developed and funded a new marketing recruitment strategy involving internet and radio advert sing.



#### **ADMINISTRATION > Corrections**



### Correct ons

The Kirkland Police Corrections Division is responsible for maintaining the security of the 62-bed Kirkland Jail, as well as booking, housing, and transporting prisoners. The Kirkland Jail currently has 20 of cers, including supervisory staf.

The Kirkland Jail houses both male and female inmates for misdemeanor crimes for up to one year. Those charged with felony crimes are housed at King County Jail in Seat le. Neighboring agencies Medina and Clyde Hill contract with the Kirkland Jail to house their inmates.

In an ef ort to control the daily populat on and the steep increase of people being incarcerated, the Kirk-

land Jail continues to be a frontrunner in looking at alternatives to incarceration. There are many advantages to this for the city and citizens of Kirkland, as well as for the people receiving alternatives to jail sentences. These programs include Work Release, Work Crew, Electronic Home Detention, pretrial Alcohol Monitoring with Electronic Home Deten-

t on, and Day Report ng.

Fun Fact? In the year 2016, these programs saved the City 3,641 days of jail t me, with a cost savings of \$327,690.



the department's public records requests, and Concealed Pistol License applications. Internally, Records is in charge of processing case reports and supplemental documents, citation and infract on data, and informat on requests from of cers, detect ves, and the court.

One of the Unit's annual goals was to complete compliance with the Washington State Archives Retent on Schedule for our backlog of cases. In 2016, KPD had over 148,000 cases past the retent on period. Research was conducted on each case to determine wheth-

er the case could be destroyed, kept due to longer retent on criteria, or transferred for archival to the Washington Association of Sherif's and Police Chiefs (sexual crime cases) or to the Washington State Archives (major crime cases that have exhausted appeals and have been closed).



Kirkland PD contracts with North East King County Regional Communication (NORCOM) to provide our telecommunication services. NORCOM telecommunicators

NORCON

Police, 2502

answer emergency and non-emergency calls for several area police and fre departments, including Kirkland Police and Kirkland Fire.

In 2016, NORCOM answered 306,490 total calls; 165,600 were 911 calls and 98.9% were answered within 10 seconds (King County standard is 90%). NORCOM, which currently has about 63 telecommunicators on staf, hired 18 new telecommunicators in 2016. Trainees receive 400 hours of classroom training in NORCOM's in-house academy. In October, NORCOM developed a Peer Support Team, which allows

employees to have dedicated peers to help in incidents of critical incident stress debriefs and to provide support for telecommunicators dealing with death, violence, and serious incidents.

Fun Fact? Only 1% of applicants successfully pass the test ng and background invest gat on to become NORCOM Telecommunicators.



### **ADMINISTRATION > Evidence / Fleet**


### Evidence

Our Evidence Unit is in charge of managing evidence related to criminal invest gat ons, found

property, and items held for safekeeping purposes. This involves the intake, storage, security, release, and disposal of items—and it is accompanied by crit cally important chain of custody rules.

Kirkland PD has two full-t me Evidence Technicians, who work trelessly to maintain the array of items

that are in our Evidence storage at any given t me, which includes anything from jewelry to narcot cs to weapons to vehicles.

Our Fleet support team consists of

Fleet Manager Tim Ult can and Emergency Vehicle Technician Kenny Gavigan. They are responsible for the daily maintenance of over 80 police vehicles, including patrol cars, detect ve vehicles, motorcycles, UTVs, and training vehicles.

During 2016, our Fleet team out it ed six new patrol cars for KPD. This is quite a job: they add everything from the backseat cages to the wiring, interior lights, push-bars, police radios, computer consoles, equipment boxes, light bars, and the classic black-and-white paint scheme.

In September 2016, Chief Harris recognized our Fleet team with the Chief's Award for Excellence in Teamwork, not ng the following about the quant ty and variety in their workload:

The Division pledges to maintain high standards of ethics, integrity, and operational efficiency throughout the Kirkland Police Department, recognizing transparency and accountability as important components in this mission.

The Professional Standards Division Captain provides general management for the diverse sect ons housed under the Professional Standards umbrella. The Invest gat ons Lieutenant oversees the Detect ves, Family Violence Unit, and Crime Analysis Unit; the Risk Management Lieutenant is in charge of the Training Unit and departmental specialty cadres.

In April 2016, Professional Standards Captain Harris promoted to Chief of KPD. Captain Ursino took her place as Professional Standards Captain. Following the retrement of Lieutenant Krebs, Lieutenant Haslip took over the Invest gat ons Lieutenant posit on. Lieutenant Brouelet e, upon her promot on from sergeant, became the Risk Management Lieutenant.

### School Resource Of cers

As part of our commitment to community policing, KPD has two full-t me

School Resource Of cers, who are assigned to Lake Washington High School (LWHS) and Juanita High School (JHS). Popular SRO R. King f nished up his 7-year tenure as SRO af er the 2015-16 school year at JHS. Beginning with the 2016-17 school year, SRO T. Davidson took over at JHS. SRO B. Hardesty began his sec-

ond year at LWHS in fall 2016.

SROs perform a variety of functions at the schools and in the community, from their standard law enforcement role to event security to counselors and teachers. SROs teach law, government, and health classes to students and put on presentations such as the DUI collision reenactment at LWHS, which

reenactment at LWHS, which was done with the help of School Resource Office Davidson at the DUI

Kirkland Fire and Airlif Northwest. KPD SROs are also experienced ALICE trainers, leading classes for Lake Washington School District teachers and administrators and for City Hall employees. ALICE, which stands for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate, teaches civilians how to respond to an act ve shooter threat.

The SROs have established an outreach program to the local middle and elementary schools in order to build relationships with students before they reach high school.





During 2016, NRO Weber coordinated KPD

involvement in events such as National Night Out, the popular Touch a Truck event at Summerfest, the KPD Citzens' Academy, and neighbor-

hood associat on meet ngs. She also served as the homeless liaison for KPD, patrolled the Cross Kirkland Corridor, and provided site visits and trainings for local facilities and retrement homes.

**Fun Fact?** NRO Weber also brought a new crime awareness program to Kirkland in 2016: Pup Patrol. Local dog walkers are encouraged to report suspicious behavior they observe while walking their dogs.

### **PROF STANDARDS > Investigations**

### Invest gat ons

The Invest gat ons Unit conducts invest gat ons of felony crimes, incidents of domest c violence and child abuse, and death reports. The Unit also processes major crime scenes, serves search warrants, analyzes crime stat st cs for trends, and tracks registered sex of enders living within the City of Kirkland.

Detect ves work closely with both neighboring and federal agencies to monitor crime trends and criminal act vity.

The Unit allocates one detect ve to the US Secret Service Electronic Crimes Task Force. Untlits disbandment in June 2016. one detective was also allocated to the interagency Eastside Narcot cs Task Force.



In 2016, KPD created three new anchor detective positions—each anchor detective will serve in the Investigations Unit for **ten years** (instead of the usual five-year rotation). This allows the individual investigator to build upon his/her training and experience to become an expert in the field.



## Family Violence Unit

The Family Violence Unit conducts follow up invest gat ons of domest c violence crimes and crimes involving vulnerable adults and children. The Unit consists of two specialized detectives and a victim advocate. The FVU is also augmented by the Domest c Abuse Response Team (DART), an all-volunteer civilian team that assists the advocate by providing support services to vict ms of domest c violence.

### Crime Analysis

Our Crime Analyst tracks crime pat erns and trends, publishes crime maps and law enforcement bullet ns, and analyzes crime stat st cs for use in planning law enforcement act vit es.

She also works to promote the exchange of informat on among regional law enforcement agencies, which makes for more ef ect ve regional policing.







**Marijuana Grow Houses:** In March 2016, Kirkland patrol of cers became aware of a house in Kirkland that

contained a large marijuana grow operat on. Kirkland detect ves took over the investgat on and learned that there were two other houses in Kirkland associated with the original house that also contained large marijuana grows. Kirkland detect ves applied for search warrants to enter and dismantle all three grows. Several subjects were ar-



imately \$25,000 in equipment was seized for destruct on.



**2016 Homicide:** In May 2016, a homicide occurred in the City of Kirkland, involving subjects known to each other. Both were heavily involved in drug traf cking. Kirkland detect ves spent a signif cant amount of t me tracking leads and conduct ng interviews in this case and have developed probable cause for Juan Galeana Madrigal (AKA "Pelon"). A warrant has been issued for his arrest. As of the end of 2016, Madrigal's whereabouts are unknown and Kirkland detect ves are working with federal agents to locate him.

**2014 Homicide Conviction:** In early 2014, a domestic violence homicide occurred in the City of Kirkland, where an estranged boyfriend strangled his girlfriend to death. Kirkland detectives worked tirelessly, conducting interviews, col-

lecting forensic facts, and building a circumstantial case that resulted in the arrest of the boyfriend. In June 2016, the case was

presented to a King County jury. The suspect, Burrell Cushman, Jr., was found guilty and sentenced to 24 years in prison.

**Disruptive Resident:** In July 2016, Kirkland detect ves focused invest gat ve ef orts on a subject who was causing fear and concern in the Evergreen Hill neighborhood. It was reported that this subject was fring of weapons inside his house and in the street mostly at his known associates, but also put, no innecent poighbors.

and in the street, mostly at his known associates, but also put ng innocent neighbors in danger. Kirkland detect ves developed probable cause for his arrest on mult ple counts of assault and served a search warrant at his house. The subject was placed under arrest and is currently in custody in the King County Jail, await ng trial for assault and federal weapons charges.







#### **PROF STANDARDS > Training**

### Training Unit

The Training Unit, headed by Sergeant T. Knafa and supported by Training Of cer T. Trombley, is responsible for creating,

coordinating, scheduling, and documenting a wide variety of training opportunit es for the Kirkland Police Department.

In addition to internal training, KPD hosts training courses open to outside agencies. In 2016, such classes included: Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving

Enforcement, Criminal Investigative Analysis, Leadership & Performance Accountability, ALICE Active Shooter Training, Taser Instructor, Hostage Negot at ons, Social Media Training, and Blue Courage.

Our EVOC Cadre (short for Emergency Vehicle Operation and Control) handles driving-related training. This includes pursuit driving, high- and low-speed driving, safety considerations, and the Pursuit Immobilizat on Technique (PIT).

With the promot on of Lieutenant R. Saloum, Sergeant T. Knaf a became the new EVOC Cadre head. Under direct on



from Chief Harris. the cadre worked hard to develop a new pursuit poli-

cy. The EVOC Cadre put on department-wide training on this

new policy, as well as training on safe driving.

2016 in-service training focused on PIT skills. Officers learned to PIT vehicles in dynamic situations and in tight 90 degree corners.

58 officers completed the training, conducting a grand total of approximately 1,450 successful PITs!



Less Lethal

The KPD Less Lethal Training

Unit (LLTU) is in charge of training department members on and providing maintenance for Tasers and Sage launchers. All Kirkland PD of cers receive Taser training, then are issued and required to carry the Taser. A number of patrol of cers also become qualified to carry another less lethal option: the Sage Deuce Launcher, which deploys 37mm "impact batons."

Members of the LLTU as-

sist in scenario-based trainings as subject mat er experts and as safety of cers.





#### **PROF STANDARDS > Training**

### Firearms

The Firearms Training Unit provides safe and ef ect ve development and implementat on of the departmental frearms training and qualif-

cations. With our move into the new Kirkland Just ce Center in 2014, we acquired a state-of-the-art. lead-free range. This has allowed us to our departmental increase



frearms training capacity (previously, we had to borrow other departments' or commercial ranges). It also provides an ideal training location for our SWAT team operators.

In 2016, our Firearms instructors held two separate days of training in the range, conducted in conjunct on with the Defensive Tact cs Cadre. Topics this year included frearm use in close quarters and scenario-based training. The instructors even brought a vehicle into the range for use in the scenarios.





DT Cadre Instructors are expected to be experts in current defensive Defensive Tactics tact cs case law and methodology as

they instruct our ranks. All Kirkland Police of cers receive training in various skills, such as handcuf ng, restraint techniques, takedowns, batonwork, OC (pepper) spray, and ground tactics. Of cers must then apply these skills in dynamic training scenarios.

2016 saw a considerable increase in DT training hours from recent previ-

### Peer Support Team



In **October 2016**, the Peer Support team held a "Family Night," hosted by Chaplain Vince Armfield and featuring team Mental Health Professional, Renee Balodis-Cox, as the keynote speaker. Renee spoke about living, coping, and communicating with a family member who works in law enforcement. Approximately 50 people—KPD officers, employees, and family members—attended the event, which also included an introduction from Chief Harris, a firearms safety talk from Sergeant D. Willson, and an overview of Peer Support from Officer K. Thomas. Due to the event's success, the team plans to present another Family Night in 2017.

The Peer Support Team is a group of commissioned and non-commissioned personnel, along with a mental health professional and the department's chaplain. These individuals provide all Kirkland PD employees the opportunity to receive emotional and tangible support through times of personal or professional crisis. Team members are trained in crisis intervent on stress management and of er assistance in a privileged capacity when providing support under the Privileged Communications Law.

### PROF STANDARDS > Explorers / Citizens' Academy

### Explorers



Kirkland Police Explorers are young adults, aged 14-20, who are contemplating a career in criminal justice. The program exposes Explorers to the feld through training,

competton, mock scenes, and other activities. There is even an Explorer Academy, where part cipants can experience a police academy environment.

Outside of the classroom, Explorers gain real-world experience as they assist with security and traf c control for city special events.

Following the retrement of our former Chief Eric Olsen in September 2015, Captain Bill Hamilton served as our Interim Chief. The subsequent Chief select on process concluded with the promot on of Kirkland PD Captain Cherie Harris to the posit on of Chief of Police for the Kirkland Police Department. Chief Harris stepped up to the plate in April 2016, when she was sworn into her new of ce by Judge Michael Lambo and presented with the promot on by City Manager Kurt Triplet.



In an ef ort to cont nue strengthening and improving our department, we reached out to Berk Consulting to develop a strategic plan for Kirkland PD.
