






Growing Region

Add about 1.2 million jobs by 2050. Outperforming the national economy



- Fewer persons per household means greater demand for housing



- 81% of the growth since2000




Legacy of Discrimination

(CHAS, 2015-2019)







Kirkland's Housing Needs





Statewide Growth Planning Framework



Goals and policies must:

- Plan and accommodate housing affordable to all income levels
- Address the legacy of zoning
- Address patterns of disinvestment
- Identify displacement risk
- Prevent or reduce displacement

Regional Housing Strategy





Build more housing of different types



Provide opportunities for residents to live in housing that meets their needs



Create and sustain long-term funding sources to create and preserve housing for very low-income households and unhoused residents

Ideas from Younger Population



• Locally and Regionwide, there is a concerned about providing affordable housing options for existing and new residents.




- Provide loans to developers to build housing in less expensive areas of the city.
- Rezone areas with new housing to locating services and jobs near where people live. (More concentration of people, jobs, services reduce crime with more eyes on the street)
- Reduce the cost to build housing by encouraging builders to buy in bulk and reduce code and permitting barriers restricting construction of multiple buildings of same design.
- Mitigate soft cost of construction of affordable housing by lowering permitting fees and expediting permit approval.



- Promote and provide more access to housing assistance to priority populations.
- Improve the existing inclusionary housing requirements to provide more affordable housing.
- Provide grants for emergency rental assistance.

Kirkland Human Services





2023-2024 grant-funded programs are grouped into 5 goal areas:

- Housing stability and food security
- Supportive relationships and community belonging
- A safe haven from violence and abuse
- Physical health and mental well-being
- Education and employment opportunities

Human Services Element



Goals and policies:

- Define the City's role in fostering diversity and equity
- Support nonprofit organizations that serve economic, social and quality of life needs of community members, including those who historically faced barriers


