Double down on Missing Middle Housing! We still haven't seen uptake on duplexes and triplexes

Car-free Downtown

Reduce Minimum Lot Sizes

Find ways to communicate a positive vision. EXAMPLE: Feriten Spur Park as a new great amenity embraced by community.

Rethink Transportation Corridors. Don't just amend.

Reinforce the idea of creative missing middle options. Co-housing; shared facilities; go beyond duplexes and triplexes!
